CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE 1. Name.

This Association shall be known as The Shiawassee Baptist Association.

ARTICLE 2. Object.

The object of this association shall be to gather information as to the state of the Churches, their statistics, to promote Christian Fellowship; and to advance the various benevolent enterprises of the denomination.

ARTICLE 3. Membership.

This association shall be composed of Baptist Churches which approve of this constitution and work in harmony with the same.

ARTICLE 4. Meetings.

This association shall, by delegates from the churches, meet annually on the second Wednesday and Thursday of June.

ARTICLE 5. Delegates.

Each Church shall be entitled to three delegates, and one additional delegate for every fifty members, or fraction thereof above one hundred.

ARTICLE 6. Officers.

The officers of this association shall be a Moderator, Secretary and Treasurer, Church School Superintendent, and delegates to the Baptist Convention of The State of Michigan, and one member to Board of Managers of said convention, as provided in Article VIII, section I of the By-Laws of the State Convention. These officers shall be elected annually; their duties shall be those usually performed by such officers.

ARTICLE 7. Letters.

Each church shall send to the clerk, two weeks previous to each annual meeting, a letter containing the numerical strength, and financial receipts, and expenditures, with a concise account of the spiritual state of the church.

ARTICLE 8. Amendments.

This constitution may be amended at any annual meeting, provided that notice of the proposed amendments be given at the meeting one year previous.

BY-LAWS

1. Each session shall open and close with prayer.
2. Each meeting shall be governed by the parliamentary usage common to such gatherings.
3. The order of business shall be arranged by the program committee, subject to the vote of the delegates present.
4. A nominating committee composed of five delegates from as many churches shall be appointed at the opening session of each annual meeting.
5. The program committee shall consist of, moderator, clerk, pastor of the entertaining Church, and presidents of the auxiliary associational organizations.
6. The moderator shall appoint at the first session of each annual meeting the following committees, each to consist of three delegates except the Denominational Objectives Committee which shall consist of five delegates.

STANDING COMMITTEES

Denominational Objectives. Ordination.

Temporary Committees

Resolutions, Obituary, Place and Preacher.

7. It shall be the duty of Denomination Objectives Committee to itemize a definite program of objectives for the several churches of the Association in co-ordination with the State Convention and Northern Baptist Convention Objectives, and present the same with recommendations to the Association at the Annual Meeting.
8. The secretary-treasurer shall receive five dollars annually for services rendered.
9. Each church shall make contribution toward the expenses of the convention and association at the rate of two cents per-member for each cause.
10. These by-laws may be changed at any annual meeting by a majority vote of the delegates present.

MINUTES

The Ninety-first Annual Session of The Shiawassee Baptist Association was held with the Dewitt Church Oct. 7-8th, 1926. The meeting was called to order 9:30 a. m., punctual by the Moderator Mr. Harry W. Buckborough, who led those present in a very appropriate opening prayer.

A motion was then moved and supported that we adopt the printed programs as the official program of the Association.

Rev. W. Herbert Grant, led us in the singing of two or three good old hymns, and Rev. Harold Slocum of Corunna gave a beautiful exposition of Matt. 7:13-27.

Mrs. Cole of the entertaining Church now gave a brief but spicy address of welcome, which received a warm hearted response from the Moderator.

Dr. John E. Smith now reported in brief on the ordination of Rev. Thomas Toy, and Rev. W. Herbert Grant which had taken place within the association during the past year.

Rev. Geo. Lawrence gave a brief report of the activities of The Committee on Evangelism during the year.

Rev. Grant now led us in the singing of a devotional hymn which prepared the way for the Annual Sermon by Rev. H. A. Huey. The sermon was based on Acts 4:31-32, and gave us much food for thought as well as a fresh inspiration to go back to our Churches with faith to believe that if our strategy is found in the wisdom and power of Jehovah, victory is secure.

Smith our State Executive Secretary, spoke on "The Church and Her Denominal Task", conducting a worthwhile conference on general Church Work after his address. Mrs. Halpenny who was on the program for this hour had consented to make the change for the convenience of Dr. Smith.

The noon hour was taken up with a conference led by Mrs. Ludwig in which many points in missionary interests for women and young people were discussed which we hope will help in the home church problems.

The afternoon meeting was called to order at one thirty by the president, Mrs. Rideout.

The Devotional was led by Mrs. Howard Slocum of Corunna. She read the 13th Chap. of First Corinthians, taking Love as her topic. A Hymn, "Only Trust Him" was sung.

A talk was given by Dr. Bachelor of Kalamazoo college. His subject was Christian Education.

An invitation was given by Ovid to hold our spring meeting with them and was accepted.

The President appointed the nominating committee: Mrs. Howard Slocum, Mrs. O. D. Canfield, and Miss Loa Carter.

The collection was taken amounting to \$12.48.

Miss Edna Clingan gave us a very interesting talk on her work in Porto Rico. She contrasted the difference between the rich and the poor. Also the many different colors of the people. Some almost white and others very black. Nearly all speak the Spanish language. School children learn English. Baptist work in central part of the Island. There are 47 churches with 3,000 members. Her church is in Ponce and has 200 members, and is the largest church on the Island. The need is for more churches and larger buildings.

Several prayers were offered for our missionaries and their work. After a song, "Love Lifted Me", the meeting was closed with prayer by Rev. George Hudson.

EVENING SESSION, OCT. 7

7:30 p. m.

The session opened with a song service led by Mrs. Warren Holmes of Lansing who substituted for Rev. Grant.

The Moderator read John 3rd chapter as the bases of some brief remarks that he made by way of a devotional, and called on Rev. Thos. Toy, and Rev. E. D. Wright to lead in Prayer.

We were now delighted with a Piano Solo by Mrs. Holmes, which received a very hearty applause from the audience.

The time had now arrived for the address of the evening and Miss Marion Davis, of St. Clair, Mich., (recently returned from the Home Mission Field) spoke to us in a very attractive and enlightening way for 40 minutes on "Our Task at Home." At the close of the address Miss Edna Clingh, returned foreign Missionary and Miss Davis, sang for our pleasure "I Come to The Garden Alone", in the Spanish language.

The meeting closed with the benediction which was offered by the Rev. Coleman, pastor of the M. E. Church of Dewitt.

MORNING SESSION, OCT 8

9:30 a. m.

The meeting was called to order by the Moderator, and Rev. Donald T. Grey led us in a song service. Bro. Levi Miller led in prayer and Dr. Ralph W. Hobbs, brought us the morning devotional thought from Obediah 17th verse, urging us to possess our possessions.

The Association Clerk now read the letters from the Churches, and a motion was made that a digest of the letters be published in the minutes. (Digest will be found elsewhere in this copy.)

The report of the nominating committee was now read and the secretary ordered to cast the unanimous ballot for entire slate of nominations. The secretary reported one ballot cast.

Bro. E. D. Wright of Elsie now invited the association to meet with the Elsie Church for its next meeting. The invitation was graciously accepted.

It was now moved and supported that the Articles of Association and the amount of Associational Dues, be published in the Annual.

It was now moved that the Church send to Mrs. Grinnels of the DeWitt Church its greetings, this sister being one of the good old soldiers of the Cross who because of infirmity was unable to attend the Association.

Rev. Chas G. Morse, new State Director of Town and Country work, gave us a fine address on "The Church and Her Associational Task."

Rev. Frank L. Currey of the State Staff, spoke to us on "The Church and Her Evangelistic Task." The hands of the clock indicated that it was 12:15 p. m. and the association adjourned for lunch.

Rev. Donald T. Grey led in a brief song service, and Dr. Hobbs again led us in the devotional thought.

Rev. J. C. Austin now spoke on "Stewardship," and said many very worth-while things.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS

The Committee on Resolutions of the 91st annual meeting the Shiawassee Baptist Association presents the following resolutions:

1. Whereas, We believe that war is not only contrary to the spirit and teachings of Jesus, but also is ineffectual as a method of settling international disputes; therefore be it Resolved, That we put forth every effort to bring about the substitution of the arbitrament of law, reason and conciliation for that of slaughter; and that we urge all men to ally themselves with efforts for the peaceful settlement of international disputes.
2. Whereas, The preservation of our national life depends upon the laws of the land and the loyalty of our people to those laws; and Whereas, We find ourselves today in the midst of a wave of utter disregard for laws, especially those enacted pursuant to the Eighteenth Amendment of the Constitution of the United States; therefore be it Resolved, That we earnestly appeal to our people to show by their attitude and conduct a real passion for law obedience and for law enforcement, by influence and example upholding the laws of the land.
3. Whereas, We believe that the Baptist Denomination under God has an unique mission to perform and an individual witness to give; therefore be it Resolved, That we urge the use of Baptist literature in the Sun-

day Schools and other religious training groups in our Baptist churches; and be it further

Resolved, That we pledge anew our loyalty to the denominational program of the various missionary and beneficent activities of the Northern Baptist Convention.

4. Whereas, The destiny of our Baptist Denomination lies largely in the hands of its future leaders, who are the youth of today, and

Whereas, The responsibility for the preparation and education of these children and youth lies with the present generation of adult church members; therefore be it

Resolved, That we put forth every effort to secure for an increasing number of Baptist young people a higher education that is distinctly Christian in its character.

5. Resolved, That we hereby express our deep appreciation and sincere gratitude to the following, all of whom have had a part in making this meeting of the Shiawassee Association a success:

a. Representatives of various denominational activities; Miss Edna Clingh and Miss Marian Davis, Dr. Frank Bachelor.

b. Pastors of the Shiawassee Association who have had a part on the program.

c. Members of the staff of the Michigan Baptist Convention.

d. The women of DeWitt who have so graciously furnished the meals.

e. The DeWitt Baptist Church which has entertained the Association with fine Christian hospitality.

f. The Moderator and the Program Committee whose planning has given us this 91st meeting of the Shiawassee Association.
