(6) That the five agencies form a group to develop and

ordinate a comprehensive Missions Education Strategy.

80. The floor was opened for nominations for first vice-president Gene Watterson (N.C.) nominated Olan Runnels (Mo.). Ron Fish (Mo.) nominated Milton Morales (Mo.). Ballots were cast for fi vice-president.

81. Second Vice-President Mrs. Carl Bates (N.C.) was asked take the chair. She explained the unique nature of the major feature of the evening program, a combined presentation by the Radio Television Commission, the Foreign Mission Board, and the Hon Mission Board on the theme, "Let the Church Reach Out-by

Means-to All People-Everywhere!"

82. Secretary Routh presented Fred Gregg (D.C.), the teacher a Sunday School class in Washington of which President Jimm Carter is an active member. Gregg spoke of the keen personal terest of President Carter in the Bold Mission Thrust of the Co vention and, particularly, of recent conversations with the President resulting in a group of the Convention's leaders being invited to conference with the President to discuss ways to enlist a large num ber of young people, also older people, as volunteers for a period missionary service. A historic feature of Gregg's presentation cluded a message by President Carter heard by the messengers videotape: a challenge to commitment to our mission task.

In this connection, Owen Cooper (Miss.) presented Recommend tion No. 23 in behalf of the Executive Committee and moved

adoption. The motion passed.

Recommendation No. 23

(1) We recommend that the Southern Baptist Convention, working in operation with the state conventions, seek to enlist by 1982 5,000 persons, gro of churches, or churches who would agree to provide and fund 5,000 missi volunteers who would go for one or two years, either in the United States overseas, in an effort to reach the objectives of the Bold Mission Thrust. hoped that the churches will also encourage an increase in Cooperative Progr giving by some percentage each year and that the churches will seek as a to double their Cooperative Program gifts during this same period of time projected by the Stewardship Commission.

(2) We would urge the state mission boards, the Home Mission Board, the Foreign Mission Board, working with Woman's Missionary Union, Broth hood Commission, and Sunday School Board, to join in the enlistment utilization of these volunteers to the greatest degree possible during this

year period.

(3) We suggest that a workgroup composed of five (5) state secretary to be named by that group's organization; five (5) persons representing five agencies mentioned in Item 2 (2) above; and five (5) members of Executive Committee, to be appointed by the Executive Committee chairman; other desired members as the workgroup may feel necessary; be named to be to the September Executive Committee meeting methods, plans, and programs activate, enlist, and finance this mission activity, and that the chairman of Executive Committee be named as the chairman of the workgroup.

83. An effective audiovisual feature presented the challenge "I every person in the world shall have the opportunity to hear gospel of Christ in the next twenty-five years, and that in the pu entation of this message, the biblical faith be magnified so that men, women, and children can understand the claim Jesus Chil has on their lives" (from the report of the Missions Challenge Co mittee of the Convention, 1976).

84. The Chair announced an offering to assist in defraying the expense of the program just presented.

85. Following special music by Southern Baptist Singing Men. singing "Glory to His Name," Frank Pollard (Miss.) spoke on the subject, "The World God Loves." Bruce Gardner (Idaho) led the Convention in prayer to conclude the evening session.

Wednesday Morning, June 15

86. Presession music was presented by the Weiuca Road Baptist

Church Choir, Atlanta, Georgia, directed by Jack Gantt.

87. President Sullivan called the Convention to order. Jack Gantt (Ga.) led in singing "To God Be the Glory." Lloyd E. Batson (S.C.) led the messengers in reading selected Scriptures. Calvin M. Bailey

(Penn.-N.J.) led in prayer.

88. Secretary Kendall reported the tabulation of ballots for officers: For recording secretary-Martin B. Bradley (Tenn.), 4,841; Searcy S. Garrison (Ga.), 3,100. For registration secretary—Lee Porter (Tenn.), 4,253; Larry Maddox (Mo.), 2,758. For first vice-president—Olan H. Runnels (Mo.), 3,556; Milton Morales (Mo.), 3,532. The Chair declared the election of Bradley, Porter, and Runnels for the respective offices.

89. Secretary Kendall reported that 15,505 messengers were en-

rolled as of the preceding night.

90. The Chair opened the floor for nominations for second vicepresident. Philip H. Briggs (Tex.) nominated Ron Stone (Ky.). Gene Garrison (Okla.) nominated Richard Sutton (Kan.). Howard H. Aultman (Miss.) nominated John F. Gibson (Ga.). Ballots were cast

for second vice-president.

91. The Chair recognized Daniel R. Grant (Ark.), chairman of the Committee on Resolutions, for the first report of the committee. By common consent, it was agreed to limit debate to three minutes for each person speaking, and to have alternate viewpoints presented in order. Grant commented on the work of the committee and the procedure to be followed in presenting resolutions for consideration.

92. Alvin W. Wood (Alaska) presented Resolution No. 1 and moved its adoption. The motion passed.

Resolution No. 1-On Appreciation of the Host City

WHEREAS, The Southern Baptist Convention is enjoying the gracious hospitality of Kansas City for the fifth time, and

WHEREAS, The facilities of Bartle Hall are of exceptional quality and have

served well the needs of this Convention, and

WHEREAS, The city officials and other civic leaders, the Police Department, the bus and taxi operators, and the management of hotels and motels, all have spared no effort in assisting the messengers in the work of this Convention, and WHEREAS, Baptists of the Kansas City region, working under the leadership

of Olan Runnels, chairman of the Local Arrangements Committee, have served untiringly in providing the necessary supports for this meeting, and

WHEREAS, Midwestern Seminary faculty and students have graciously given so freely and untiringly of their time and energy to make this Convention a success, and

WHEREAS, The newspapers, radio, and television personnel have been exceptionally gracious in their coverage of the activities of this Convention.

Be it therefore Resolved, that we express our profound gratitude to all of these who have contributed so much to the enjoyment of our visit and the ef-^{ficiency} of our work.
