on science, philosophy and religion

**DR. WAYNE E. OATES**, professor of psychology of religion at the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary for 19 years, is a native South Carolinian. He received the bachelor of arts degree and an honorary doctorate from Wake

Forest College in North Carolina and the doctor of theology degree from Southern Seminary. He has been chaplain of general and mental hospitals in Kentucky and a rural and urban pastor in North Carolina and Kentucky. Dr. Oates has written 13 books and edited two others, and has served as visiting professor once at Princeton Theological Seminary and seven times at Union Theological Seminary in New York. LECTURES FOR THE SPRING CONFERENCE are scheduled daily at 9:35 a.m. in Alumni Memorial Chapel. The theme for the messages is "The Holy Spirit and Contemporary Religious Experience." Daily emphasis will be upon "The Expansion of Consciousness" (Tuesday), "Nonverbal Communication" (Wednesday), "The Ministry of Articulation" (Thursday) and "The New Morality" (Friday) as each relates to the work of the Holy Spirit in the life of the Christian church.

**DR. BLAM DAVIES**, pastor of the Fourth Presbyterian Church in Chicago, Illinois, was born in Glamorgenshire, Wales. He is a graduate with honors of the University of Wales and the University of Cambridge, England, also of the Theological College at Bala, Wales. He was ordained to the ministry in 1944 and served two pastorates in Great Britain. He has preached at Presbyterian General Assemblies on both sides of the Atlantic and has been visiting professor of philosophical theology, Christian ethics and homiletics at Temple University and McCormick Theological Seminary. Last year he was invited to be special visiting preacher in Presbyterian churches in Sydney and Melbourne, Australia. Dr. Davies came to the United States in 1952 to be pastor of First Presbyterian Church in Bethlehem, Pennsylvania, and was elected to his present post in Chicago in 1961. DURING THE SPRING CONFERENCE the pastor will lecture and conduct discussions in seminary homiletics classes and will preach daily at 10:30 a.m. in Alumni Chapel.
