## *RULES OF ORDER.*



1. The Moderator and Clerk shall be chosen annually, by ballot, immediately after reading the letters and credentials, those of the former years continuing in office until the choice is made.
2. "Kerfoot's Parliamentary Practice" shall be the standard of rules by which the deliberations of the Association shall be governed.
3. The Clerk shall keep a record of the proceedings, taking care of the books and papers belonging to the Association, and furnish a copy of the Minutes of its transactions at each session for publication and distribution among the churches.
4. At every sitting, business shall be opened and closed with prayer by the Moderator, or whomsoever he may request.
5. Corresponding members and ministers invited to a seat with the Association may debate, but shall not vote on any subject before it.
6. No member of the Association shall absent himself without leave of the Moderator.
7. No person shall speak more than once on any motion, until all others wishing to speak have spoken, unless by permission of the Association.
8. Arrangements for the next Association shall not be attended to on the first day of the session.
9. When two or more churches apply for the Association to be held with them, the one applying which has been the longest without it, shall be entitled to it.
10. The Roll of Messengers shall be read the second and third days of the Association, and any Messenger known to have been present during the session shall be counted as present.
11. The basis of representation from the churches shall be two Messengers from each church, and an additional one for fifty members, and one for every fraction over twenty—and no one shall be eligible to a seat who is not a member of the church sending him.
12. The minutes shall be leisurely read and corrected, if necessary, before the rising of the Association.
13. These rules shall be distinctly read by the Clerk immediately after the organization of the Association.

**PROCEEDINGS**  
OF THE  
**Elkhorn Baptist Association.**



The Elkhorn Baptist Association met in its One Hundred and Seventeenth Annual Session with the David's Fork Baptist Church, Fayette County, Ky., August 12, 1902, and was called to order at 10 o'clock by the Moderator, Bro. J. R. Howard. After singing of that dear old hymn, "Come Holy Spirit Heavenly Dove," the Moderator requested all present to join in a silent prayer, that God's guidance and blessing might be with us, after which Bro. J. M. Frost, the Secretary of the Sunday-School Board of the Southern Baptist Convention, led in prayer; then sung "Amazing Grace." Dr. B. D. Gray read the 92d Psalm; song, "Come Thou Fount of Every Blessing." Prayer by Dr. Gray; song, "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name." Prayer by Bro. E. F. Wright. Then Bro. T. J. Stevenson, of Georgetown, preached the introductory sermon, Gal. 6-14, and it was a sermon of a great deal of force. Salvation by grace and grace alone, the subject. After the sermon the reading of the letters was called for, and the Moderator requested Bros. Gray and Hughson to read them.

### *Report of Committee on Foreign Missions.*

We have abundant cause for profound gratitude to God for His blessing the past year. We praise Him for abounding grace, and should earnestly pray for a deeper sense of obligation, increased by His larger blessings of success. The past year has been the most successful in our history. There were 1,429 baptisms as compared with 1,009 the year before, an increase of 420. The sum of \$173,439.49 was contributed. The contribution the year before was \$156,083.33, an increase the past year of \$17,356.16. Kentucky contributed \$21,971.96, as compared with \$15,560.18 the year before, making an increase of \$6,412.78. Bequests amounting to \$5,557.92 are included in this amount. Contributions from living contributors are \$16,414.04. The increase from living contributors was \$853.86.

Twenty new missionaries were sent out during the year. There was no death among the missionaries, but Dr. H. A. Tupper, Corresponding Secretary for more than twenty-one years, passed to his reward.

In contributions Kentucky rose from fourth to second place in the list of States, Virginia alone leading in a contribution of \$25,312.01. The Board asks for \$25,000 this year from our State. This will mean an increase of \$9,585.96 over the contributions of the living contributors of last year. Will we do this? We shall have to increase our contributions more than fifty per cent. This will require most earnest prayer, some self-denial, much faithful, patient, earnest work; courageous, plain, loving preaching and teaching, and liberal example on the part of the pastors and leaders of the churches, and a large increase of faith in God.

Elkhorn Association contributed last year for Foreign Missions \$1,822.39, as compared with \$2,265.30 the previous year, making an actual decrease of \$442.91.

We recommend that Elkhorn Association endeavor to raise her part of Kentucky's increase and that earnest prayer be made to God in behalf of this work; that the hearts of our people be enlarged and thoroughly enlisted in the great work of world-wide evangelization.

We recommend the Foreign Mission Journal also, published in Richmond, Va., as a valuable helper in the work. It costs 35 cents singly or 25 cents in clubs of ten or more.

Report of Committee on State Missions read by Bro. J. K. Nunnely and adopted.

### *State Missions.*

If we turn to the North or to the South, to the East or to the West, the

great subject of State Missions is ever before us. Possibly few of our people appreciate the importance of this work as fully as we should. State Missions is the basis of successful work along all missionary lines. To shut our eyes to its claims upon us, or to fail to recognize the obligations that are upon us as individuals and churches, is a sin against Him who loved and redeemed us by His precious blood. Every intelligent Baptist in this favored section of our State ought to daily pray this prayer; Lord, what can I do to advance this great work which Thou hast committed to our hands? Many of our people have and are praying this prayer, and the Lord in His own way is indicating their work. The reports from Rev. J. G. Bow, the Secretary of State Board, and others who are well acquainted with the various fields and progress of the work, are encouraging. The following appears in the last report of our State Board:

"There is much to encourage us in the increased and increasing interest in State Missions. The contributions for the year surpassed those of last year \$5,365.42. Many churches are now on the list of contributors which never gave before. The territory of operations is widening, and the demands for increased contributions are upon us. More men are employed, and greater efficiency is manifested by our missionaries. Doors of usefulness are continually opening to us, and opportunities are multiplying. The churches and people are becoming better acquainted with the nature and needs of our work, prejudices are breaking down, and the obstacles to success are diminishing. When our people learn that State Missions are of prime importance, the very base of supplies, the source from which our real strength must come to foster and sustain Home and Foreign Missions, then we may expect to see progress on all lines of the great mission work our Master has committed to us. In the Master's name we plead for greater interest in, and greater fidelity to, this important feature of our work."

In the minutes of Elkhorn Association 1901 Bro. E. F. Wright reported that Elkhorn Association gave to State Missions the previous year \$837.50, one-half of which was used in this Association, and recommended that we give for this year \$1,000.00 in addition to the funds used in this Association. The report of the Treasurer shows that the churches of Elkhorn Association have given for State Missions during the last year only \$644.37. Brethren, the Lord commands and the work demands that we go forward and not backward. Shall we heed the call and acquit ourselves as good soldiers of Jesus Christ?

Report on Home Missions read by Bro. S. A. Owen and adopted.

### *Home Missions.*

It is gratifying to know that the Home Board, of Atlanta, Georgia, which has this work in charge, is, under the direction of its new and efficient Secretary, F. C. McConnell, in a very prosperous condition. The Board reported for last convention year nearly \$99,000 raised for the work, an increase of more than \$12,000 over the previous year. Several churches in our own State are to be credited in part for this large increase, the gifts of the entire State to the Board amounting to nearly \$9,000. This material prosperity of the Board is due largely to the hearty support of denominational papers and to an increased circulation of tracts, giving information on various departments of the work in charge of the Board.

The money given last year was richly blessed of the Lord. It employed wholly or in part about 700 missionaries, who reported for the year more than 8,000 additions by baptism, more than 9,000 additions by letter, and organized 900 churches and Sunday-Schools. Every department of the work supported by the Board seems to emphasize the wisdom of increasing our gifts. In fact the convention sustained a resolution at Ashville to try to raise one-fourth more than was raised last year.

With confidence in our Board, and with loyalty to our Master, let us prayerfully and generously continue to support the work.

### *Report on Sunday-Schools.*

Report read by Bro. I. B. Timberlake; adopted; discussed by Bros. Frost; Timberlake, T. Warn Beagle, Musselman and Felix.

There are in the Southern Baptist Convention 19,653 churches, with a membership of 1,683,039, and 10,404 Sunday-Schools, with 712,012 pupils.

Kentucky has 1,671 Baptist Churches, with a membership of 190,994, and in these churches there are only 978 Sunday-Schools, with 53,655 pupils.

There are 500,000 children in Kentucky between the ages of 6 and 16 who do not attend any Sunday-School, and in all the Protestant churches in the State only 100,000 can be found in the Sunday-Schools. In other words, for every child in the Sunday-School there are five children out of it.

During the past year there were 9,321 baptisms in Kentucky, and 2,226 of these were from the Sunday-Schools. Last year in the Elkhorn Association there were 222 baptisms and 64 were from the Sunday-Schools.

Statistics show that the Sunday-Schools in connection with the State Board are doing a great work, and have made large advances over that of the past year. New schools have been organized and thousands of Bibles and tracts have been sold and given away.

A Sunday-School missionary has been appointed for mountain work, and we are grateful to note the progress of Colportage work in Kentucky. Twenty-one men have been sent out this year.

The General Board of the Southern Baptist Convention has furnished free literature for one quarter for all Mission Schools organized during the past year, and gave \$360.00 in books for distribution.

The Sunday-School Board has also furnished the means for an annual lecture course in the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary at Louisville distinctly on Sunday-School work.

We point with special pride and call attention to the work of the Sunday-School Board located at Nashville, Tennessee, and the remarkable success

which it has achieved. This Board is doing a noble work in the publication and distribution of the best denominational literature for Baptists in the South, and its Sunday-School publications cannot be surpassed. We do most heartily commend this literature to our churches.

Your committee would further say, that it is not only the duty, but the exalted privilege of every member of our churches to manifest a deep interest in the work of the Sunday-School. Children are apt to be what their parents are and do what their parents do. Teachers in the Sunday-School can do but little with children who see so much indifference on the part of their parents in reference to this great work.

We would therefore urge parents, not only to send, but bring their children to church and Sunday-School. And let parents see to it that the lessons are also taught the children in the home.

We would also recommend that the younger children be taught some good Catechism.

### *Report on Young People's Union.*

Report read by Bro. Preston Blake; discussed by Bros. Blake, Argabrite, Frost, Prestridge and G. H. Nunnally. Adopted.

Special prayer by Bro. E. F. Wright for more consecration on the part of pastors and people that there may be a great out-pouring of God's spirit and there may be a great ingathering of saved.

The Baptist Young People's Union of Kentucky has for its object according to its constitution: 1. The unification of our Baptist young people, that is, the bringing of them together in intelligent and hearty co-operation for effective accomplishment of the work that God has given them to do. 2. Their increased spirituality; that is, the widening and deepening and strengthening of their spiritual life. 3. Their stimulation in Christian service, that is, the leading out and directing into the widest channels of usefulness the sanctified activities of lives consecrated to God's service. 4. Their edification in scripture knowledge through intelligent and systematic Bible study. "that the man of God may be perfect, thoroughly furnished unto all good work." 5. Their instruction in Baptist doctrine and history; that is, the inculcation of the precious principles and practices that have given us power in the world as a denomination, and the impartation of the knowledge of the thrilling record of the glorious achievements of our "Fathers in the faith," that the Baptists of the coming generation may be wise and able defenders of the faith once delivered to the saints. 6. Their enlistment in all missionary activity through existing denominational organizations, that our churches may be zealous in their efforts to carry out the commands of our Lord Jesus Christ, to go into all the world and bear witness, and to baptize, and to disciple, and to teach.

The movement has made great progress in the State during the year. More Unions have been organized than during all the five years previous.

They are both practical and doctrinal. One lesson each month is devoted to some phase of missions. It also furnishes valuable suggestions in the study of these subjects.

There is no work fostered by the Baptists of Kentucky which appeals to us all more strongly than our own well conducted Orphans' Home. There is no

call to which we more heartily respond, and there is no visit or more sincerely welcomed to this body than Miss Mary Hollinsworth Long may she be spared to us and to this work.

Surely there is no interest committed to us for which we may more confidently appeal to the brotherhood and upon which we may pray with more expectant faith, the Father's blessing.

He who had not where to lay his head, who took little children in his arms and blessed them, and who gave his own mother into the care of his friend, will accept as service rendered to himself that which we do for these homeless children of our brethren.

The Home does not ask for luxuries, but bare necessities. Who among us will deny bread and shelter and teaching to these dependent ones? There have been received into the Home this year 17, and 23 have been placed out. There are now 76 in the Home, of whom 39 are girls and 37 boys. Are there not childless homes among us awaiting some of these children?

We request and urge all our churches to liberally contribute to this work, and that pledges be asked from the churches and individuals today, and that we here and now make a voluntary cash offering.

### *Schools and Colleges.*

Report of Committee on Schools and Colleges read by Dr. B. Gray and adopted; discussed by Bros. Gray, Hibbs and Thompson.

The Baptists of Kentucky need not more, but better schools. Equipment in the buildings and apparatus is one of our necessities. Libraries and laboratories are henceforth indispensable. Teachers in our first-class colleges and high schools even are not able to buy the books of reference needed in their departments. They must be supplied by the institutions themselves and this necessity will increase constantly. The very best scholarship, broad, accu-

rate, thorough, is called for in all our schools. Only teachers of solid learning, thorough culture and special training can meet the educational demands of our times. Unless one can speak with authority, he cannot teach with power. And more important even than great scholarship and teaching ability is character. Our children are too precious to have the moulding of their character entrusted to men who are gifted only in the technical learning of the schools, but are deficient in personal character. And piety is the basis of true excellence of character. We see at once the necessity for Christian education or education under Christian auspices, and for us of Baptist education.

Your committee would refer our people to the minutes of the General Association for information concerning the various schools under Baptist control in Kentucky, and beg leave to call special attention to Georgetown College, the only Baptist school within the bounds of our Associational territory. While the college belongs to the Baptists of the State, it is especially the pride of the Elkhorn Association. Its chief support in the past has come from our Association, and the inspiration and leadership in the great forward movement now proposed for the college must come from the same source.

The work of the college is in a most gratifying condition. The discipline is mild, but firm, and the order has been exceptionally good during the past session. The largest class in the history of the institution was graduated in June. At the annual meeting of the Board of Trustees the Science Department was greatly strengthened by the election of two professors, Dr. Garnett Ryland and Prof. J. A. Kessler, the former to the Chair of Chemistry and Physics, the latter to the Chair of Biology, both of whom are eminent specialists in their lines of study.

The Normal Department will be in the hands of Prof. A. L. Rhoton, who brought that work to a high condition of efficiency three years ago, since which time he has pursued his studies at Columbian and Chicago Universities.

The college is entitled to the patronage of our Baptist people. It is doing admirable work. We need, however, enlargement of our facilities, especially in the Science Department. And we must have additional teaching force in the near future.

The Trustees have decided to undertake the raising of \$200,000 for endowment in the immediate future. The need for this is imperious. We must have it. Even with this splendid sum our endowment would be \$12,000 less than that of one of our immediate competitors. Your committee, therefore, recommend that the Baptists of the Elkhorn Association give their heartiest support to this great movement for the better equipment and endowment of Georgetown College. ### *Report on Temperance.*

Report on Temperance read by Bro. Argabrite; adopted. Discussed by Bro. Argabrite and Dr. Young, Secretary of the Interdenominational Temperance Board.

Your committee on Temperance beg to submit the following report:

When one sees, as he must if his eyes are half opened, that wickedness is lifting a high head these days, that the immorality of the world is certainly of the most desperate type; that drunkenness is on the increase, the question of the attitude of the child of God towards these things should not be difficult to settle.

There is a teaching abroad that the highest form of religion is to withdraw from the world; to have nothing to do with it—not even to vote; that seeing our citizenship is in heaven we have no business with things on earth.

This sounds beautiful, and looks spiritual; but to put it bluntly, it is the veriest humbug ever foisted upon people who are desirous of obeying the Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.

One of the outstanding teachings of the Bible, written over every page, is the call for aggressive goodness; it is our business to attack evil, to rout it, to drive it from the face of the earth. When John came he attacked sin, and struck it with the whip of a scorpion. He did not hesitate to say to the men of his time that they were a generation of vipers.

What if Christ had not attacked evil? He came to a world submerged in a sea of degradation; into this sea of sin and misery He plunged and made possible its salvation. If any man would be like his Lord and Master, he must stay in the world, not withdraw from it. He must strike at sin, he must move

upon it with his voice, his personal influence, and—his vote. It is not enough to be negatively good; we are to be aggressively righteous, until the world comes to believe that the church is not a place for the weak and crippled, but that it is God's military establishment on earth as well.

Therefore be it Resolved, First—That we endorse and commend the work of the State Local Option Committee, and pledge ourselves to enter with renewed energy into the work of this committee, giving financial aid to the same.

Second—That we as temperance voters of the Elkhorn Association will see to it that no man is nominated by any party who is not definitely committed to the County Local Option Bill, and will vote against all men who refuse thus to commit themselves, regardless of party and party nominations.

Third—That as pastors of the churches of this Association, we will at some appropriate time during the coming Associational year preach a sermon on temperance. Respectfully submitted and signed by G. W. ARGABRITE,

### *Report on Minister's Aid Society.*

The Minister's Aid Society is one of our most important enterprises. The men who wear out their lives in the service of God in the ministry and are left dependent in their declining years should not go neglected. In order to meet the needs of this enterprise abundant rooms should be built and furnished comfortably, which would entail considerable expense additional to the means needed annually as beneficiary gifts to the veterans of the Cross. There have been aided 29 ministers during the past year. Four beneficiaries have died. We recommend annual offerings to the work. The expenditures the past year amounted to \$284.20. The endowment fund is \$32,206.19.
