RULES OF ORDER.

MANAGEMENTAL

- 1. The Moderator and Clerk shall be chosen annually, by ballot, imme diately after reading the letters and credentials, those of the former years continuing in office until the choice is made.
- 2. "Kerfoot's Parliamentary Practice" shall be the standard of rules by which the deliberations of the Association shall be governed.
- 3. The Clerk all keep a record of the proceedings, taking care of the books and papers belonging to the Association, and furnish a copy of the Minutes of its transactions at each session for publication and distribution among the churches.
- 4. At every sitting, business shall be opened and closed with prayer by the Moderator, or whomsoever he may request.
- 5. Corresponding members and ministers invited to a seat with the Association may debate, but shall not vote on any subject before it.
- 6. No member of the Association shall absent himself without leave of the Moderator.
- 7. No person shall speak more than once on any motion, until all others wishing to speak have spoken, unless by permission of the Association.
- 8. Arrangements for the next Association shall not be attended to on the first day of the session.
- 9. When two or more churches apply for the Association to be held with them, the one applying which has been the longest without it, shall be entitled to it.
- 10. The Roll of Messengers shall be read the second and third days of the Association, and any Messenger known to have been present during the session shall be counted as present.
- 11. The basis of representation from the churches shall be two Messengers from each church, and an additional one for fifty members, and one for every traction over twenty—and no one shall be eligible to a seat who is not a member of the church sending him.
- 12. The minutes shall be leisurely read and corrected, if necessary, before the rising of the Association.
- 13. These rules shall be distinctly read by the Clerk immediately after the organization of the Association.

PROCEEDINGS

OF THE

Elkhorn Baptist Association.

The One Hundred and Eighteenth Session of the Elkhorn Association was held with the Mt. Freedom Baptist church, at Wilmore, Ky., commencing on Tuesday morning, August 11, 1903.

The meeting was called to order by the Moderator, Bro. J. R. Howard, at 9 o'clock a. m. Opened with the grand old hymn, "Joy to the World." Prayer by Bro. W. C. McCall. Devotional exercises conducted by Rev. T. Warn Beagle, who read the third chapter of the epistle of John. The following brethren were called on and led in prayer: J. E. Shropshire, C. B. Report on Home Missions.

It is with exceeding regret that the Home Board, of Atlanta, Ga., has been brought face to face with the resignation of its most efficient Secretary, F. C. McConnell, a man of sterling value to the Board. The Board has secured the services of Dr. B. D. Gray, now President of Georgetown College, whose services no doubt will prove satisfactory, and the work of the Board go forward. The work of the Home Board for the past year ending April 30, 1903, has been

very gratifying.

Cash receipts for the year were \$116,452.62 An increase of \$9,671.75 over the previous year. The Board employed 671 missionaries. There were 8,969 baptisms, with a total addition to churches of 18 690 members. 280 houses of worship have been built and improved. Kentucky stood fourth in cash contributions to Home Missions, having contributed \$10.591.21 in cash, and 53 boxes sent to Home Missionaries amounting to \$4,280.80, which gives Kentucky the first place in boxes sent. The Board has spent for State expenses in Kentucky \$399 97, for missionaries, \$3.727 08. Elkhorn Association gave last year to Home Missions \$976 39.

The Board asks for \$200,000 this year. This amount will be insufficient, for the needs are increasing, the harvest is ripe, and the urgent cry for help comes from every quarter. Let us stand by our new Secretary, supporting the organized work with our prayers and means.

Report of Committee on Foreign Missions.

The very last command that issued from the lips of our Divine Redeemer was "Go disciple the nations," "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature." It should be sufficient for every follower of our Lord to know that this is His will concerning us. Alas, that some of His followers are still disobedient or inattentive to His Divine command! How can anyone claim to be a follower of Christ who persistently disobeys or neglects this last and plainest and greatest of His commands. But the principles of missions lies deener even than obedience. Our Lord commanded his followers to preach the gospel in all the world because it is right. It is not only right because Christ commanded it, but it would be right even if He did not command it, inasmuch as Christianity is healing, helpful and preferable to heathenism.

Even so we should seek to extend it on the principle of what is best for the human family. The principle of religion is love—love to God and love to man. Love to God should lead us to seek to know and to do His will. Love to man should lead us to helr elevate and bless mankind in every reasonable and right way. So missions appeal to us from the standpoint of reason,

obedience and benevolence.

The method of doing this thing is only incident to the thing itself. No method or manner of doing anything is inspired. Our Lord in revelation deals in fundamental principles, not in the manner in which these principles should be carried into effect. So all fierce and unbrotherly and unchristian contentions about boards and methods in general, are unwarranted by the Word of God. Let us go forward using the methods that seem best suited to accomplish the desired result; let us stand together and do the work. Experie ce has taught us the wisdom of doing the work through committees or boards. Our Foreign Mission Roard has done valuant service and upon it God has

surely set the seal of His Divine approval.

Last year was apparently the most inspiring in our missionary history. Contributions exceeded all that had been asked or hoped for, reaching the total of \$218,512.62. And God who inspired the giving, wrought on our mission field the rich reward of 1,790 conversions and baptisms. A larger number than the year previous by 351.

Under the enthusiasm of the great results, the S. B. Convention has directed the Board to still go forward and to project enlarged plans. The Board has asked for \$300,000, and upon its faith in God and His people, they are arranging to send out thirty new missionaries. Kentucky is asked for \$30,000. What will Elkhorn Association do in this grand work? We feel that much depends upon the pastors. They should give the people information concerning the hopes and plans of the work and to the full of their ability lead in the

We would however recommend that the Association appoint a committee who shall to the best of their ability estimate the amount that Elkhorn Association ought to raise of this \$30,000 and then apportion to the various churches amounts according to their ability and arge them to raise these amounts. In all right ways let us seek to arouse the enthusiasm of ur people. We can accomplish more by having a definite end in view.

The wide-open doors of the world inviting the gospel, the great blessing upon the work and the prophecy of the speedy triumph, constitute a call which we cannot afford to neglect. By His manifold mercies and blessings, Respectfully submitted. let us determine to go forward.

Report on Orphans' Home.

The Orphan's Home has a large place in all our hearts. There is no cause of benevolence that should receive a more hearty support by the Baptists of Kentucky than our own well-conducted Orphans' Home at Louisville. Unnder the efficient management of our beloved Superintendent the Home has grown and prospered. During the past year 14 have been received into the Home; 10 have been placed out by adopt on, and 10 apprenticed. At present there are 69 in the Home, 38 of whom are girls and 31 boys. Are there not some childress homes in Kentucky that will open their doors to receive some of these little ones? Miss Mary Hollingsworth has always been a welcome visitor to the Elkhorn Association and we still want her to feel that her presence is desired and appreciated. It is a matter of special interest that during the past year a generous bequest was made to the Home by Mr. W. F. Norton, Jr., (deceased) of Louisville. The news of this gift may tend to a diminition in contributions to the Home. But this should not be the case. In the first place we do not know how large the gift is, and in the second place it will be five years before any part of this gift can be used to supply the needs of the Home. The actual needs of the Home are as imperative as ever before So let us support it by our prayers and our offerings. Let us see to it brethren, that neither the churches nor the individuals of Elkhorn Association be tound lacking in their contributions to this noble work. We further request that to-day, a liberal contribution be made to the Orphans' Home. Respectfully submitted,

Report on State Missions.

Your committee are gled to report that from all over the State the news comes of progress. Dr. Bow, our State Secretary, reports larger offerings than in any previous year, and yet through the regular channels the contributions from the State amounted to only \$8,564.70, an insignificant sum as compared with what Kentucky is able to do, and with what other States of less ability are doing. Verily brethren, we need enlightenment, enlistment and enlargement all along the lines. By all methods and in all ways let us seek to enlighten our churches on the crying needs of our State and of the world. That there are many churches inactive is sorrowfully confessed, but we believe this is primarily due to the lack of proper teaching. The germ of missionary life is implanted in every regenerated soul, but many who are really converted are sadly neglected. We need increased pastoral efficiency in the cultivation of the grace of giving among the churches. Our pastors should not only seek to get a contribution from every member of their flocks, but should seek to lead them out into the cultivation of the destitute sections adjacent to their churches. To do this faces the churches outward and gives a new spirit and a new purpose to church work. The field is the world and the churches are the forces to cultivate the field. Christ said "go" and the truth seek to concentrate everything upon themselves are sickly weaklings.

Churches that exist simply to exist, will not exist long and ought not to. The spirit of conquest is the spirit of well-being and healthfulness in every church. In our Association there has been increased contributions. The Executive Board has been able, as will appear from their admirable report, to aid the churches at Sadieville, Wilmore. Fifth Street, Lexington, and Clover Bottom, not so much as they would have liked, but as much as the contributions justified. With greater emphasis on the part of the Executive Board and by the pastors upon the needs of the work of co-operative evangelization in our own bounds contributions will increase an hundred fold. It has been frequently noticed that as God prepares a force He also opens fields for the force. Strength and opportunity go together in the providence of God. In our Association along the Kentucky river from Handy's Bend to Oregon Bend, taking in High Bridge, Brooklyn, Faircloth and McCown's Landing, is a section of great and distressing destitution. These people are not as ignorant of the gospel as the Hindoo and Chinese, but they are without gospel privileges and their children are growing up in neglect and ignorance of the New Testament teachings. These points lie adjacent to Mt. Freedom, Clover Bottom and Hillsboro churches. Two of these churches are themselves very weak financially and are being helped by the Executive Board, which work your committee heartily commend. For it is quite as important to save churches as to constitute churches. The work of development as important as that of evangelization. Here the two go hand in hand—as we help these churches they are the proper channels through which to reach these destitute adjacent places. And your committee would most respectfully suggest to the Executive Board the propriety of making Mt. Freedom a center from which to reach these points. If a willing, wise evangelistic pastor could be located at Wilmore, who should also be pastor of some other church for two Sunday mornings, leaving him free in the afternoons, for these two points, who should also hold week night cottage meetings among these people in the destitute sections, incalculable good would result. Then the city of Lexington affords a rich field for a missionary and since the churches there have no separate city work from the Association but have gone into co-operative work with this Association. A man qualified and fitted for city missionary work should be located there whose business it should be to do a house to house work and to hold cottage meetings in the different sections of the city week nights as well as on Sunday afternoons and evenings. The State Board recommends and expects the District Associations to do their own missionary work if they are able to do this—simply turning over the overplus to the State Board for the help of the weaker associations. With this in view your committee would further suggest that the Executive Board canvass the needs of our bounds and provide for it—raising as much more as possible for the help of the weaker Associations of the State. The opportunities within our bounds, if improved, will make our churches ever increasing powers both in self-edification in the cultivation of the home field and in the evangelization of the earth. Our fathers planted, let us water and God will give the increase. We cannot consider our duty done until the mission spirit glows in every church, till every church thrills with the spirit that moved the Son of God to come this sin cursed earth and give himself for a lost world. When we shall reach this New Testament standard each church will become a lighthouse and the glory of the Christ will speedily fill the whole earth. In closing we would commend the colporteur work recently inaugurated by the Executive Board. As we have observed the work of Bro. J. B. France, we most unhesitatingly give him our endorsement, as an efficient, faithful man of God in this work given into his hand. We present this report with a feeling of profound gratitude to God for mercies past and with strong confidence in the future of the work. Much progress has been made, far more is possible. If we will get back into the primary business of soul winning the very windows of heaven will open and blessings innumerable will be poured out upon us. Oh, brethren, let the intense conviction get hold upon us that men are lost. and that they may be saved; that as churches, ministers and members we are responsible to God for the evangelization of the world, beginning at our doors. Report on Schools and Colleges.

On the whole our Baptist schools in Kentucky are doing well. They report good attendance and better facilities and equipments. Some have added substantially to their funds. Several schools have suspended for one cause or another, mostly for lack of support. The wise location of our institutions of learning would largely settle the question of their efficiency and permanence. Undoubtedly there is a tendency to undue multiplication of the number of schools, which in turn multiplies the calls for help. In some way the best wisdom of the denomination ought to express itself as to the number and location of the schools that are to appeal to the denomination for support. This is a subject upon which the General Association has been temporizing for several years. It should be considered seriously and promptly by that body. We have not time to mention even by name the nineteen schools discussed by the Educational Committee in their report to the General Association recently convened at Winchester. A word must be said about our Seminary. The last session has been one of great prosperity. The attendance was large and the work excellent, and substantial progress reported in the effort for increased endowment. A bequest of \$60,000 was left to the institution, and though the will is being contested, it is believed that it will hold good and the Seminary will get the money. The Seminary is the place above all others for our young men who seek thorough preparation for their lifework in the ministry. Georgetown College must claim the chief support and sympathy of this great association. We had a very prosperous session, having an attendance of 367 as against 340 the previous year, notwithstanding the lowest grade in our academy was dropped. If this grade had been counted the attendance would have been 389. We have discontinued our Normal Department, as the college stands for general culture and is not specially equipped for technical Normal work. There have been several changes in the faculty. Profs. Kesler and Ayers have gone to Bayler University and Crozer Seminary respectively; but Dr. Garnett Ryland comes to the chair of Chemistry and Physics and Prof. Kline becomes instructor in Biology and Physical Director. So that we shall have the best arrangement for physical science that we have ever had, and our athletics will be first-class. Prof. Aver's work. pending the raising of the endowment, by a happy agreement with the Georgetown church, will be in part taught by Dr. E. B. Pollard, the rest being taught by Dr. Arthur Yager, who shifts his lowest history class to another teacher. The teaching will, therefore, be in first-class shape. More recently President B. D. Gray has resigned to accept the Corresponding Secretaryship of the Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention. The most pressing matter before the College now is the raising of \$75,000 to meet the conditional offer of Mr. J. D. Rockefeller of \$25,000 for additional endowment. The \$75,000 must subscribed by January 1, 1904, and paid by January 1, 1907. Payments are to be made in four equal installments, as follows: January 1, 1904, January 1, 1905, January 1, 1906, and July 1, 1906. Nothing compares in importance to raising of this money. It must be done, if the college is to continue her great work. Every church and every member of each church ought to be enlisted. Let the Elkhorn Association lead out grandly on this movement. To lose this great opportunity would be to set us back in our forward, aggressive work. Let this movement till December 31st overshadow everything else. Let outside calls wait. This must be done. In the name of God, and for this great cause may our people be united as one Respectfully submitted, man.

Report on Temperance.

We can report a marked advance in public sentiment against the liquor traffic. Business enterprises of all kinds demand to-day as never before clear heads and steady hands. The drinker is relegated to the rear to bear the bur dens in the lowest forms of manual labor. The Congress of the Unite States has taken advance ground against it. The great religious and benevolent organizations of the country have dinounced it. The individual consciences of the church people are being gradually quickened. The sorrow, suffering, degradation and ruin arising from the use of intoxicants for beverage purnoses are weighing upon human hearts as never before. The channel through which these evils flow is the legalize lop in saloon. Against this institution our efforts are now lirected. The organization by which we expect to secure its suppression is known in the United States as the Anti-Saloon League, in Kentucky, as Local Option. To make this method efficient we must have some amendments to our present local option law. These amendments have been before the last three legislatures and each time were defeated by the influence of the friends of the traffic. Another legislature will be elected next November. It the name of suffering humanity, in the name of pure religion and good morals, we therefore appeal to the voters of Kentucky, that they elect no man to the legislature unless he will pledge himself to support the amendment to our Local Option law known as the County Unit Measure.
