followed by an impressive prayer by the Moderator.

The letters from the several churches were read and Messengers' names enrolled.

On motion a Committee of 5 was appointed by the Moderator on Credentials.

After which the Association stood adjourned till 3 P. M Benediction by Rev. R. Lee.

TUESDAY AFTERNOON SESSION, 3 O'CLOCK.

Association assembled. Hymn 767th sung. Prayer by Rev. E. W. Green. Minutes of the morning session read and approved.

The Committee on Credentials presented their report relative to church representation in the Association. (See list of Churches and Messengers.)

By appointment of last Convention Rev. E. W. Green, at night, delivered the Introductory Discourse, Text, Exodus 15, 11-"Who is like unto thee, O, Lord, among the Gods, who is like unto thee, Glorious in his holiness, fearful in praises doing wonders."

After a happy presentation of the subject there was a collection of 312.35 for associational expenses.

Dr. Pratt presented some avaluable suggestions pertaining to the securing of a suitable edifice in view of the theological training of the colored ministry, and the best method to be devised to accomplish the end. He assured the Association that there are many friends to the cause in Kentucky, who would, and will, liberally contribute to the laudable enterprise when we first have essayed to do our part. His remarks were heartily endorsed.

Brother Burbanks (white) presented a few pertinent remarks relative to the importance of the project in view, and promised his aid in due time, after which a spirited amount of free thought was expressed by Rev. G. W. Dupee, Rev. R. T. W. James, Rev. R. Lee, Rev. R. Martin and others. The time having been spent most interestingly in the interchange of views.

It was resolved that the night session be devoted to speaking, allowing each speaker 5 minutes to express his views at any one time.

After which the Association stood adjourned till 8 P. M. Benediction by Rev. H. Adams.

Louisville gaining by a majority of one, after which, on motion, Louisville was unanimously considered as the place.

Therefore we deem it wrong and highly derogatory to the cause of Christ, to recognize the reception of any justly excluded person from a Regular Baptist Church by any church of the same faith and order, except they have been restored back to the clurch from whence they have been excommunicated. We present this item of vital interest to all Regular Baptist churches, hoping it may be carried out so as to ever preserve our christian fellowship inviolate. late.

2. We recommend that Baptist Literature be exclusively used in said schools.

3. We would recommend to the patronage of the Baptist denomination, Rev.

W. J. Brown, Missionary Colporteur under the auspices of the American Publication Society, located 530 Arch Street, Philadelphia, for the purchasing of such
denominational books as above mentioned.

4. We recommend that every church will essay to have a good Sabbath School

Library.

5. We recommend the "Sunbeam," a Sunday School paper edited by Rev. R. F. Perry at Brooklyn, New York. The paper can be obtained on the following terms: 100 copies per annum, sent monthly at \$12.00

6. We recommend the organization of a Sabbath School Convention [at such time and place as the Association may direct.

ON MISSIONS.

Being fully impressed with the vast importance of Missionary work 1. We recommend to all pastors and churches to organize Missionary Boards in their churches, and make their bounds to extend half way between each church and that the Pastors and Licentiates carry on the Missionary work in those bounds.

2. We recommend that the various District Associations of Kentucky, belonging to the Colored General Association, would organize District Missionary Boards and employ one or more Missionaries to operate in said localities.

Resolved, That the officers of the Association be empowered to borrow \$130.00, balance of debt money to pay off the debt off the Hill Property.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE BOARD.

Your board submit their annual reports for your consideration. A few years ago, God in his allwise providence, saw cause to cut loose the bonds of slavery and proclaimed freedom to about four millions of his oppressed people, and to this people the true Gospel should be preached uncontaminated.

There is an immense field for labor in this state. Our people, who are scattered all over this state, in every direction, are in great many localities; suffering for the want of the Gospel, they are calling upon us to send more laborers in to the vineyard. There is a considerable number of broken down Churches among our people, which should be re-established, and our scattered members again gathered in the sheep fold.

Your Board reccommend that steps be taken immediately, to aid in organizing and establishing both Sabbath and Day Schools, in all of the needful localities everywhere throughout the state as far as practical, for the purpose of instructing and training our children at home, in the true doctrine of the bible. It is of vast importance that we should exert ourselves to promote the progress of our people, other denominations are exerting themselves, and bringing to bear a powerful influence upon the minds of our children to entice them a way from the true faith and inculcate in to their minds; different sentiments from them laid down in the Bible and taught by our blessed Saviour while he was here on earth.

The time has come for our people to awake from their long slumber, and look where they are floating to, and arrest the under current, that is washing away our liaptist material and threatening our complete overthrow.

Your Board would recommend that a suitable number of missionaries

be placed in the field immediately to labor in all of the needful localities. Your Board would recommend that the Association take under consideration the proposition made by the General Association of Baptists while they were in session in Louisville, May the 20th, 1869, in relation to organizing and establishing a Literary and a Theological School in Louisville for the purpose of training and instructing of our people in the ministry.

And also, our White friends propose to place missionaries in the field

to labor for the special benefit of our people.

RULES OF DECORUM.

1. No brother can speak more than twice on any subject without the permission of the Association.

2. Every brother must respectfully address the chair standing, he must confine himself to the question under debate and avoid personalities.

3. Any brother violating any of the easter may be called to order, in which case Moderator shall immediately decide the point of order from which decision

4. When two or more brethren rise at once, the Moderator shall name the one to speak.

5. No motion can be put without a second, and if required, it must be in writing.

6. Before the question is put on any motion it shall be distinctly stated by the chair.

7. When a subject is under delacte, no motion is in order but to lie on table, to postpone, to commit, to amend or adjourn.

CONSTITUTION

OF THE

General Association of Colored Baptists in Kentucky.

Whereas through the loving and tender mercies of our Heavenly Father, we are privileged to meet in Association, and whereas an opportunity has presented itself to us to devise means for the intellectual moral and religious culture of our race; therefore we adopt the following Constitution:

ARTICLE I.

This Association shall be known as "The Kentucky General Association of Colored Baptist Churches." The object of this Association shall be the promotion of purity of doctrine, union fellowship and cooperation in promoting subbath schools and missionary operations, and advancing the cause of our Lord Jesus Christ, throughout the entire State by meeting annually for mutual and religious counsel.

ARTICLE II.

All regular Missionary Colored Baptist Churches shall be entitled to membership in this Association. Each Church composing the Association, shall be represented at each annual meeting by messengers, and a letter setting forth the spiritual condition of the Church and the extent of its benevolent and missionary operations.

ARTICLE III

Each Messenger, before taking his seat in the Association, shall give satisfactory evidence to the Association of his appointment by the Church which he represents.

ARTICLE IV.

The Officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, Recording and Corresponding Secretary, and Treasurer, to be elected annually by ballot or otherwise, and their duties to be common to their offices as in similar Association.

ARTICLE V.

The annual meeting is to be held at such time and place as the Association may appoint.

ARTICLE VI.

This Association shall appoint an Executive Board of thirteen members who shall manage the business of the Association, and particularly to superintend the educational and missionary interests of the Association, when it is not in session, the Executive Board shall have power to fill vacancies in its own body, between the meetings of the Association.

ARTICLE VII.

The Treasurer shall hold the funds of the Association and shall pay them out when ordered by the Board, and the Board's orders shall be his vouchers also, said Treasurer shall be required to give sufficient bond and security for the safe keeping of all money committed to his care. The Executive Board are required to present a full report of all moneys received and expended, to every annual meeting.

Any District Association of Regular Colored Baptist Churches of this State, may be represented in the General Association by sending messengers and letters, at the same time contributing in proportion to their ability for missionary and educational purposes; also any church numbering six hundred members, is entitled to four delegates, and under six hundred two delegates.

ARTICLE IX.

Each Association shall be entitled to five Messengers, the membership not exceeding 2500, and for ever 500 over 2500 an additional messenger.

ARTICLE X.

Any member of a regular Baptist Church, may be entitled to a life membership by paying the sum of Twenty Dollars.

ARTICLE XI.

This Constitution may be altered or amended at any annual meeting of the Association by a vote of two-thirds of the members present.
