PROGRAM PERSONALITIES

ARTHUR SIMON, Founder and President, Bread for the World, a Christian Citizen's movement on world hunger. A Lutheran clergyman, Simon served an inner city parish on Manhattan's Lower East Side. His book, Bread For the World, Won the national Religious Book Award. His most recent book is Christian Faith and Public Policy: No Grounds for Divorce (Eerdmans, 1987)

J. ALFRED SMITH, SR. is pastor of the Allen Temple Baptist Church, Oakland, California, and past president of the Progressive National Baptist Convention, U.S.A. He has taught J-term coursed at Southern Seminary and has spoken extensively around the world: West Africa, Jerusalem, Sweden, Denmark, Mexico, Canada, Switzerland, and the Virgin Islands. He addressed the United Nations on apartheid in South Africa in April, 1989.

MOLLY MARSHALL-GREEN teaches in the Department of Christian Theology at The Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, and is Director of M.Div. studies. She travels extensively and is a popular lecturer and preacher.

JAN RICHARDSON is Director of Habitat for Humanity of Metro Louisville. She is a 1987 graduate of The Southern Baptist Theological Seminary.

W.VAUGHN WALKER is pastor of the First Gethsemane Baptist Church, Louisville, KY. He teaches Social Work at The Southern Baptist Theological Seminary.

RICK AXTELL is Director of Louisvillians Against Hunger and a Ph.D. candidate in the graduate department of Christian Ethics.

KAREN SMITH teaches in the department of Church History, Baptist History being her specialty. She holds a doctorate from Oxford University, England, and is an ordained Baptist minister.
