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## Constitution of East Union Association

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ARTICLE 1. This body shall be called East Union Association of United Baptists, and shall be composed of churches of the United Baptist faith and order.

ART. 2. Each church composing this body shall be entitled to representation with one vote for every twenty members or fraction thereof.

ART. 3. This body shall meet annually, according to adjournment.

ART. 4. This body at each annual meeting shall elect, by private ballot, a Moderator, Clerk and assistant Clerk, whose duties shall be such as custom imposes on such officers

ART. 5. The business of this body shall be for the advancement and growth of Christ's Kingdom among all the churches of this body or elsewhere, planning and advising and using all lawful and necessary means in our power to build up new churches and building them up in the most Holy faith.

ART 6 This body shall exercise no ecclesiastical authority.

ART. 7. This body may appoint a committee to carry out or perform any business under Article 5.

ART. 8. This body shall be constituted by and with messengers and delegates from the different churches belonging to this Association.

ART. 9. New churches will be received by a vote of the delegates present, upon approved evidence of their United Baptist faith and principles. A majority rules

ART. 10. Visiting brethren of same faith and order will be invited to seats with us and allowed the liberty of speech, but not to vote.

ART. 11. The constitution may be altered or amended, except Article 6, by concurrence of two thirds of the members present, after notice having been given at its previous annual meeting.

ART. 12. No member shall speak more than twice upon any one subject without leave of the Association. Chairmen of committees are given ten minutes; all others five, unless time is extended by the Association.

ART. 13. Members wishing to speak shall arise and address the Moderator with brotherly respect, and await recognition from him, and then speak. Any brother having received recognition from the chair is entitled to the floor, undisturbed, while his five minutes last, if he does not digress from the subject on which he is speaking. Members shall

call no brother by any other appellation than that of brother.

ART. 14. Any brother may arise to a point of order if any brother digress from the subject on which he is speaking, question or privilege

ART. 15. A motion with a second is before the Association for action unless another is made to amend, then the amendment is for action, afterwards the original.

ART. 16. No member shall absent himself from the house during the business hours without leave of the Moderator.

ART. 17. All whispering and laughing strictly forbidden during business hours.

ART. 18. Two members arising and addressing the Moderator at the same time, both claiming the floor, the one farthest from the Moderator shall be entitled to the floor first, and the other next.

ART. 19. This Association may withdraw its fellowship from any church in its bounds for a violation or departure from the United Baptist faith and practice.

ART. 20. The Chair, having decided any question which is thought to be contrary to the constitution of United Baptist faith, any brother may appeal from his decision to that of the house.

ART. 21. On each morning at the opening of the Association there shall be given one hour, or such less time as necessary, to the offering of resolutions and such new business as is necessary.

ART. 22. If the Moderator fails to exact the rules of this constitution in the transaction of business, any member of this Association may move him to order. If he fails to exact such rules, the assistant Moderator shall take the Chair.

It is ordered that this Association adopt "Mell's Parliamentary Practice" for our guide in the transaction of the business of our Association.

### Foreign Missions.

With thanksgiving to God and congratulations to the brethren: we, your committee report the best years work ever done by the Southern Baptist Convention in Foreign Mission fields. In the words of Dr. Willingham let us thank God and take courage. Contributions show an increase of \$58,000 over the preceding year with a total of \$460,797.62 given. Number of baptisms on the foreign fields 2905, which affords great cause for rejoicing. We now have 231 foreign missionaries, 98 ordained natives and 277 unordained native helpers making a total working force of 606. We have 259 organized churches and 559 out stations. There are 14 self supporting churches and 16,596 members in the foreign field. In addition to these churches we have 142 schools and colleges and 8 Theological Seminaries with a student body numbering 3864. We have a number of hospitals manned by consecrated christian physicians, who treated last year 42,959 patients. Another great agency to help in bringing in the kingdom is the printing press.

Ky. Baptists gave to Foreign Missions last year \$37,527.54 an increase over the previous year. It is gratifying to note the splendid increase in the gifts to Foreign Missions be some of our own churches, notably First Church of Jellico, Tenn., but it is a sad fact that most of our churches after all these years of enlightenment gave little or nothing to this great work. Brethren God has committed to our hands great wealth and is flinging wide open the doors of opportunity and is calling loudly to us to save the world in his name.

### Home Missions.

How gladly we make and hear a report of succes. Such is the report of the years work of the Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention. Hopes have been realized, well divided efforts have been rewarded and seed sown have borne abundant harvest. 25 109 lost men and women were converted and baptized with the fellowship of our mission churches through the Home Mission Board, an average of over seventy baptisms per day for the entire year, a net gain over last year of three thousand. There were also 22,669 additions by



letters making a grand total of 47,778 additions in all to our mission church. How we should praise our Lord for what he has done for us.

Our work would have been even greater if we could have had the means to send out more men and occupy more territory. Let us rejoice that Southern Baptists increased their gifts last year to Home Missions. \$302,864.74 were the offerings for Home Missions this year. There were 1,108 missionaries and workers who delivered 126,675 sermons, made 238,268 religious visits, organized 959 Sunday Schools, held 308 bible conferences, witnessed 146 volunteers for the ministry and mission workers, distributed 27,114 bibles, 1,742,527, pages of tracts, built and repaired 368 houses of worship and helped support 24 mountain schools. The number brought into our mission churches equals one third the Baptists in Mississippi.

In the 64 years the Board's history 5,917 churches have been organized or more than one fourth the number in the Southern Baptist Convention today.

Texas and Oklahoma have been captured for our faith through the Home Board.

Baptist education has been stimulated so in our mountain country that last year 64,122 improvements have been made on school property and the Board gave only \$16,108 of that amount.

The sane, sensible Evangelistic work of the Board conducted by spirit filled men has been marvelously fruitful in saving men and building up our Master's Churches. Our Board evangelists are blessed because they do not enter into any entangling alliances in union meetings which profit others always more than Baptists.

The whole truth is always weakened by the addition of half a truth.

The Southern Baptist Convention instructed our Board not to enter into union mission work with the Home Mission Council of New York, New Mexico has been added to our territory. \$500,000 are needed to meet the demands by struggling churches in the West for church houses. Our cities need missions planted among the thousand of foreigners and in strategic places to turn the tide of humanity to our Saviour.

Our work in Cuba increases rapidly at the rate of 44 per cent.

The Panama work moves slowly but surely.

Kentucky has been asked to raise \$25,000 and by God's help we must raise it. Will East Union do her part? Do you love Baptist truth as it is in Jesus and his word the Bible? Do you believe in conversion of the human soul and baptism of the converted only?

Then consecrate and concentrate your thought, prayers and means on saving the Southland for our Lord and his bride, the church.

### REPORT ON MINISTER'S AID,

We, your committee on the Ky. Baptist Minutes Aid Society, have collected the following data for your consideration: The Society has been in existence 21 years and in addition to the money expended for the relief of aged and infirm ministers and their widows they have accumulated \$39,050.30 of which more than \$36,000 is already invested. The receipts for last year were \$5,593.74 The expenditure for the same time was \$4,860.10. There are now 35 beneficiaries; 4 of these live in Whitley, Laurel and Knox counties. During the last year there were six deaths among these venerable servants of God and their companions, with an average age of 80 years. There is now a movement to build a home in which some of these worn-out soldiers of the cross and their loved ones may be cared for. \$1500 has already been given for this purpose but much more will be needed. We should bear in mind that one of the highest and noblest services in the Kingdom of Christ is to properly care for and minister to His servants who in response to the call of the Master have devoted their lives to the proclamation of His glorious gospel. Jesus will say in that day, "Inasmuch as ye did it unto one of the least of these my brethren ye did it unto me." Brethren let us lay up for ourselves treasures in Heaven by lovingly, cheerfully and liberally contributing to the support of these God honored servants so long as we are blessed with their presence in the flesh.

Prof. E. E. Wood conducted service reading Gal. the 5th chapter. His exposition was remarkably clear, strong and convincing.

### Report on State Missions.

The purpose of the General Association of Ky. Baptists is to secure a full co-operation of all the Baptist Churches in the state, in order that they may reach all the destitute places of the state and give them an opportunity to hear the gospel of Christ in its purity and build churches in reach of every soul.

The State Mission Board reported to the General Association of Baptists in Kentucky \$23,412 51 more to all missions than they gave the previous year. They received by conversion 3,893, by baptism 3,318, by letter 1,265, relation 281. total 8,757.

Organized 28 churches, 66 Sunday Schools. We therefore recommend full co-operation of all the churches in our Association with both our contribution and prayer.

We urge that every church in our Association take up collection for State Mission work.

The amount reported by the State Mission Board was \$109,358.51 This amount was made possible by the efforts and faithfulness of our pastors our denominational papers, mission workers, young people's societies and the women who labor with us in the gospel.

### Report on Education.

Your committee on education beg leave to report as follows:

More than two years ago our neighbor, Dr. Gatliff, Pres. of the Board of Trustees of Williamsburg Institute, greatly stimulated all Ky. Baptists to do more in a financial way for the schools and college by offering to Ky. Baptists 4000 acres of coal land upon the condition that they would collect \$400,000.00 in money within two years. The effort was made to raise the funds under the auspices of the Ky. Baptist Education Society by the Rev. P. T. Hall, D. D., Secretary of that society. Under this same offer pastor Hibbs and his people of Williamsburg were enabled to give and collect from generous friends in the North the larger portion of this money and thereby added to the funds

of our own colleges, of which all Mountain Baptists are justly proud, the Williamsburg Institute. This will add much to the facilities of the Institution in doing its great work, and now puts it upon a high plain of usefulness. We heartily commend our Institute to all our young people as a place where they may get a first class education, and we also commend it to the prayers and liberality of our people.

We take great pleasure in calling the attention and heartily commending to our brethren our own great Southern Baptist Theological Seminary of Louisville, Ky. This is the greatest Theological Seminary in the world and Dr. Mullins, its great president, under the direction of the board of trustees, is now directing a great campaign in all the South for \$600,000.00, to be added to the funds of the seminary. Any Baptist minister who desires to attend the seminary can receive material aid by loans and gifts to help him in getting a Theological education. We are thankful to see that some of our preachers are availing themselves of the opportunity afforded by our seminary in getting an education.

We sincerely hope that from this good day on all of our young men will attend the seminary, and thus qualify themselves to preach the gospel. We have many other good schools in this state that we, for the want of space, cannot mention here.

In the state we have 26 Baptist Sunday School Unions organized including our Whitley County Baptist Sunday School Union, in which only 10 of our Sunday Schools have taken membership. We earnestly recommend that every church without a Sunday School, proceed at once to organize and send delegates to the meeting of the Union at New Zion Church Oct. 29-31, 1910.

We recommend that all our Sunday Schools use literature of Baptist Sunday School Board, Nashville, Tenn. This is one of the most important departments of our denominational work and must not be neglected if we are to hold this country for the Baptists.

### Report on Temperance.

We your committee on temperance submit the following report:

"Get the facts before the people " The liquor traffic antagonizes every effort for good in the church, state or nation, and is the producer of distress, poverty and crime It is the blight of childhood, the shame of manhood and the fountain of sorrow, heartaches for the mothers and wives of our land, and last but not least the destroyer of the soul.

We are exceedingly glad to call your attention to the many temperance battles and victories during the past year. The temperance movement is driving the saloon as chaff before a mighty wind. We call your attention to the great and good results of the County Unit law of Ky. as it now stands on the statute books it enabled 98 of the 119 counties to rid themselves of the saloon curse, giving 90 per cent of the people dry territory. We therefore insist that if it is good enough for 90 per cent why not extend this good law to the whole state and take in the other 10 per cent. During 1908 as we swung around from East to West and from North to South winning notable signal victories here and there, we voted 11,000 saloons out of business, 30 per day, and swept the old Volunteer State of Tenn. into the dry list of states making the ninth state to board the water wagon, and are now camping in my old Ky. home preparing for a final pitched battle, which will land Ky. in the dry column, where she can lie down in green pastures beside still waters and sing, My Old Ky. Home, as never before. The splendid victories for temperance won in Ohio, Ind. Mo. Ill. and in fact nearly every state in the Union are so glorious that only seven states have no dry territory, 70 per cent of the U. S. is dry and 52 per cent of the population live in dry territory.

We are glad to see the Baptist people every where joining together and with other christian people to fight the great common enemy of the church and society, "The saloon business."

We therefore urge our preachers to preach more temperance and our church members to subscribe for one or more temperance papers or journals and keep in close touch with our progress along these lines, I

suggest the American Issue.

May God hasten the time when this will be a National Issue. The saloon or our boys and girls. Get the facts as they really are before the American people and the right solution will surely come,

We recommend that we all write our law maker to use their influence for National Temperance laws and especially to remove the great stumbling block of Inter-State Commerce Law which allows shipment of wet goods into dry territory.

### Letter of Directions for Orphans Home

**Orphans' Home.**

For green vegetables like pumpkins, potatoes, cabbage, etc., bore holes in barrels to let in the air and pack. The sides of boxes can be nailed with some space between the boards, or bore holes.

Place inside the box or barrel a slip with the sender's name, post office address, list of donors and church sending same.

Secure a bill of lading from freight agent and send same to us with a duplicate paper giving name of senders, post office address and church represented. Also list of those giving and amount given, so we can place names in our paper, the Orphans' Friend.

We stand in need of anything in the way of food supplies, as we have a family of over one hundred to provide for. Will you kindly present our needs to your church and Sunday School?
