Constitution of the General Association.

ARTICLE 1. This body shall be called the GENERAL ASSOCIATION OF BAPTISTS IN KENTUCKY.

ART. 2. This Association shall be composed of representatives from such Baptist Churches and Associations as are in regular standing.

ART. 3. Every Church and Association contributing annually to the funds of this Association, shall be entitled to a representation.

ART. 4. This Association shall, in a special manner, aim to promote, by every legitimate means, the prosperity of the cause of God in this State.

ART. 5. It is distinctly understood, that this Association shall have no ecclesiastical authority.

ART. 6. At each meeting of this Association, there shall be elected, by ballot, a Moderator, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, Treasurer, and fifty Managers, (five of whom shall be a quorum,) who shall constitute a Board of Directors for the management of all the business of this Association, during the recess of its Annual Meetings, and annually report to the same their proceedings.

ART. 7. The Moderator, Secretaries, and Treasurer, shall perform the duties usually performed by such officers in similar Associations.

ART. 8. All Associations contributing to this, and co-operating in its designs shall be considered auxiliary to it.

ART. 9. A General Agent may be appointed by the Association or Board of Managers, whose duty it shall be to survey all the destitution, the means of supply, &c., and report regularly to the Board, so as to enable them to meet the wants of the destitute. He shall also raise funds, and in every practical way promote the designs of the Association; for which he shall receive a reasonable support.

ART. 10. Any visiting brethren, in good standing, as such, shall be entitled to sit in counsel in the Annual Sessions of this Association, but shall not have the right to vote.

ART. 11. The Annual Meetings of this Association shall be on Saturday before the 3d Lord's day in October,

ART. 12. This Constitution may be amended or altered, (the 5th Article excepted,) at any annual meeting by a concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

Constitution of the Kentucky and Foreign Bible Society.

ART. 1. This Society shall be called THE KENTUCKY AND FOREIGN BIBLE SOCIETY, Auxiliary to the American and Foreign Bible Society.

ART. 2. All persons contributing annually to the funds shall be members of the Society.

ART. 3. Each contributor of thirty dollars or more, shall be a member for life.

ART. 4. Life Directors and life members of the parent Society shall be, ex-officio, members of this.

ART. 5. All Churches and Societies agreeing to place their surplus funds in the Treasury of this Society, shall be Auxiliaries, and their representatives be entitled to the privilege of members.

ART. 6. The funds of this Society, after a deduction of incidental expenses, shall be appropriated, through the American and Foreign Bible Society, as this Society may direct.

ART. 7. This Society shall annually elect a President, four Vice Presidents, a Recording and Corresponding Secretary, and Board of Managers, consisting of twenty members, all of whom shall be brethren in good standing in Baptist Churches, fifteen of them to reside in or near Louisville, and who shall hold their offices until superseded by a new election.

ART. 8. The President, Vice President, and Secretaries, shall be ex-officio, members of the Board.

ART. 9. The Board of Managers shall meet quarterly, or more frequently if necessary, at such time and place as they shall adjourn to, or at the call of the President or Secretary, and five members shall be a quorum.

ART. 10. The Board of Managers shall be charged with all business of the Society, during their appointment, and shall make a report at each Annual meeting. They shall enact their own By-laws and fill such vacancies as may occur in their own body.

ART. 11. The Society shall hold its annual meetings, at the same time and place of the annual meeting of the General Association of Baptists in Kentucky.

ART. 12. The Minutes shall be signed by the President and Secretaries.

ART. 13. No alteration shall be made in the Constitution, except by a vote of two-thirds of the members present at an annual meeting.

MINUTES
OF THE
GENERAL ASSOCIATION OF BAPTISTS
IN KENTUCKY.

ORGANIZED IN LOUISVILLE, OCT. 1837.

THE sixth annual meeting of the General Association of Baptists in Kentucky, was held with the Baptist church in GEORGETOWN, commencing on Saturday, October 14, 1843.

The Introductory Sermon was preached by Rev. WILLIAM VAUGHN, of Bloomfield, from Galatians III. 13, 14, "Christ has redeemed us from the curse of the law being made a curse for us," &c.

The meeting was called to order, the Moderator and Secretary of the preceding year officiating.

On motion, arrangements for preaching to-morrow were referred to a committee, consisting of the delegation from the Georgetown church.

The Committee reported the following arrangements: Elder F. A. Willard to preach at the Presbyterian church, at 11 A. M.; W. C. Buck at the Baptist church, at 11 A. M.; and J. M. Pendleton at 7 P. M. S. L. Helm and T. S. Malcom, at the Great Crossings church at 11 A. M.

Elder Joseph S. C. F. Frey to preach at 11 A. M., on Monday.

Elder Isaac McCoy was received as a representative of the American Indian Mission Association, and Bro. John Stevens, as Agent of the Baptist Board of Foreign Missions.

Elder A. F. Tilton, from the General Association of Indiana, and Elder Smith from the Missouri General Association, were invited to seats.

On motion, Elder Wm. Vaughn was requested to furnish a copy of his Introductory Sermon to the General Association for publication.

The report of the Board, was read by the Corresponding Secretary, and on motion was received and adopted.

The report of the Treasurer was read, and on motion received and adopted.

On motion, the Treasurer was directed to settle with our former Treasurer, and dispose of the uncurrent money in his hands, for what it is worth.

On motion, the Circular of the American Indian Mission Association was referred to a committee of Elders Curry, Craig, and Frost.

Adjourned to 7 o'clock P. M. Prayer by Elder Colgan.

SATURDAY, 7 o'clock P. M.

Met according to adjournment. Prayer by Elder R. Holman.

By request of Elder T. L. Garrett, a special committee, consisting of H. Malcom, McCalla, Long, Jarvis, and Payne, was appointed to hear his complaint against the decision of the Board on his claims.

The committee to whom was referred the Circular of the Indian Mission Association, made the following report which was adopted.

Whereas, in view of the injuries which the Indian tribes have sustained in consequence of the settlement of white men in their country, they have a stronger claim upon American christians than other nations who have not been thus injured, and whereas very favorable openings for doing them good present themselves, therefore

Resolved, That the information afforded this Association of the success and future prospects of the Indian Mission Association is especially cheering, and calls for devout praise to God; and that we hail the indications of divine Providence in favor of that society as a pledge that the wilderness shall soon be made to flourish as the garden of God; and we earnestly commend it to the favor of the churches, and the blessing of the God of Missions.

The following resolutions were offered by Elder F. A. Willard, and adopted.

Resolved, That all Associations in the State friendly to the objects of the General Association, be requested to furnish a report to our Corresponding Secretary, on or before the 13th of September, annually, of all the missionary service performed, within their respective bounds, either by appointment of the body, or gratuitously; and also of all monies raised or expended by them to sustain domestic missionary labor.

Resolved, That the report of missionary service rendered should embrace among other statements an account of the number of sermons preached, the number of persons baptized, and the distance travelled in meeting appointments.

The following resolution was offered by Elder Wm. F. Broaddus, and was, on motion, adopted.

Resolved, That the General Association of Baptists in Kentucky, become auxiliary to the AMERICAN BAPTIST HOME MISSION SOCIETY, according to the provisions made in the seventh article of the Constitution of said Society.

On motion, the following brethren were appointed as delegates to the annual meeting of the American Baptist Home Mission Society, to be held in Philadelphia, on Tuesday, April 23, 1844, namely: Elders Wm. C. Buck, Isaac McCoy, Thomas S. Malcom, James M. Frost, Gilbert Mason, Ryland T. Dillard, Thomas G. Keen, and A. Goodell,

The following resolution was offered by Elder Howard Malcom, and unanimously adopted.

Resolved, That the objects and operations of the BAPTIST GENERAL CONVENTION FOR FOREIGN MISSIONS, are intensely dear to us. We view the raising up of such individuals as Judson, Boardman, and many others to go forth to the distant heathen, and the glorious success of the missionaries in turning thousands of pagans from dumb idols to the living God, as unquestionable evidence of the Divine blessing upon the work. Standing as Baptists do, the champions of a pure Bible and a pure church, we feel it specially incumbent on us to spread light and truth throughout the world. We pledge ourselves to the Board of Managers to pray for their great enterprize, and to hold ourselves accessible to their calls for aid.

The following Resolution was offered by Elder James M. Pendleton, which was unanimously adopted.

Resolved, That it has given the General Association peculiar pleasure to meet at the seat of GEORGETOWN COLLEGE. We have formed an acquaintance with its honored President and well qualified Professors, in whom we have the utmost confidence. We have learned with unspeakable gratification, that there are in the College twenty-four young ministers, and that the number of students has been greatly increased. We have inspected the College buildings, the Library, the Cabinet, and a part of us have attended the recitations; and while we have seen much to approve, we have seen nothing to censure.

It is to be regretted, however, that an important part of the interior of the new building, remains unfinished; the want of which occasions some embar-

assessment, owing to the recent increase of the students. It is hoped that the churches will without delay replenish the Treasury, that the edifice may be entirely completed. Arguments to show the importance of the College, its influence on our denominational interests, and on the cause of literature in general, are we trust familiar to all our brethren. We most cordially commend Georgetown College to the prayers and liberality of the churches. ✓

On motion, it was voted that a committee be appointed to nominate a General Agent. Elders Vaughn, Broadbush and Keen were appointed.

Adjourned. Prayer by Elder J. H. Brown,

MONDAY, 9 o'clock, A. M.

Met according to adjournment. Prayer by Elder S. L. Helm.

The report of the Committee to nominate a General Agent was read and adopted, nominating Elder James M. Frost.

On motion, it was voted, that Elder James M. Frost be appointed General Agent, and the Board be directed to make arrangements for his Salary.

The report of the Committee in the case of Elder T. L. Garrett was read, and after being amended, it was adopted.

On motion, voted that our next annual meeting be held with the church in Henderson.

The following Resolution was adopted.

Resolved, That in the opinion of this meeting the sessions of the Association ought hereafter to be located in Georgetown.

Adjourned. Prayer by Elder James M. Pendleton.

MONDAY, 2 ½ o'clock, P. M.

Met according to adjournment. Prayer by Elder R. Holman.

On motion, it was voted that fifteen hundred copies of the Minutes be printed in pamphlet form, under the superintendence of Elder Thomas S. Malcom, with statistical tables similar to those prepared last year by our Corresponding Secretary.

On motion, voted that Elders Isaac McCoy, and S. C. Sedwick, be appointed delegates to the Indiana Baptist General Association.

Elder James M. Pendleton, of Bowling Green, was appointed to preach the next Introductory Sermon, and Elder Wm. F. Broadbush of Lexington, his alternate.

The following resolution was unanimously adopted.

Resolved, That we hereby tender our grateful acknowledgements to the church, and the citizens of *Georgetown* and vicinity for their kindness and hospitality during these meetings.

Adjourned to meet in HENDERSON, on Saturday (the 19th) before the third Lord's day in October, 1844.

Annual Report of the Board of the General Association.

At the last annual meeting of the General Association, no General Agent was appointed. The Board have sought in vain, for a brother suited to this work, whose services could be procured. Resort was therefore had to appeals through the press, which have been responded to, only in a few instances.

Several of the Associations in the State have moved forward nobly in the work of supplying the destitution within their bounds. Many of them are carrying out the plan recommended by the General Association of employing missionaries within their bounds, as will be seen by the following facts.

BETHEL ASSOCIATION.—The missionary in this Association, (whose name is not mentioned,) has travelled 3,000 miles, preached 274 sermons, delivered 129 exhortations, witnessed 226 additions, chiefly by baptism, aided in constituting two churches, and in the ordination of one minister. The Treasurer reported \$401 paid to the missionary.

At the last annual meeting in Hopkinsville, the churches pledged for missionary labor, \$412, and individuals \$231. Elder O. H. Morrow and J. Lamb were appointed missionaries.

ELKHORN ASSOCIATION.—At the last annual meeting the following resolutions were adopted.

Resolved, That the Executive Committee be authorized to employ a missionary at thirty dollars per month, to labor in and around the Elkhorn Association.

Resolved, That the churches be requested to send up to the next Association such amounts as they may think proper to sustain our Domestic mission.

The sum of \$179 87 was immediately raised in cash and subscription.

GOSHEN ASSOCIATION.—At the last meeting, Elder J. H. Brown, was appointed missionary.

LIBERTY ASSOCIATION.—At the annual meeting in August, Elder Moses Akin, was appointed as missionary of the Association. It was voted that the missionary be paid \$300 for his service, payments to be made quarterly. The missionary was directed to visit each church in the Association, and hold protracted meetings when it is advisable.

LONG RUN ASSOCIATION.—Elder Robert Melvin, at the annual meeting in September, reported 77 days spent in missionary labor, 97 sermons, 2,000 pages of tracts distributed and received \$53 77.

SALEM ASSOCIATION.—Elder C. Lovelace acted as missionary during the year. He reports 131 sermons, 20 exhortations, and 1002 miles travelled. He has baptized 20 persons, and received \$44 43.

UNION (WEST) ASSOCIATION.—An Executive Committee was appointed at the meeting in September, to employ an itinerant preacher. One hundred and five dollars was subscribed for the purpose.

There is perhaps no state in the Union in which more *gratuitous* missionary labor is performed. One pastor recently preached in nine weeks, 46 times in destitute places, without any compensation, in addition to preaching twice each week to his own church. Probably many have exceeded this.

Should each brother in the ministry, report the number of sermons preached during the year, we are persuaded that an amount of Home Missionary labor would be presented, almost incredible.

But there is much ground to be possessed. Important places are destitute of a regular ministry.

Some of the Associations are engaging in systematic plans of benevolence, with commendable zeal. The BETHEL ASSOCIATION stands foremost. At its last annual meeting, it was resolved that \$200 be raised as a fund, to purchase the books of the American Baptist Publication Society, and one of the missionaries to act as colporteur.

The proposed sum was subscribed on the spot. A society was organized under the name of "*Missionary and Bible Society of the Bethel Association, auxiliary to the American and Foreign Bible Society, and the Baptist General Convention for Foreign Missions.*" The annual meeting of the Society is to be held on Tuesday after the fourth Sunday in September. J. Barnett, President, W. I. Morton, Vice President, T. G. Keen, Secretary, N. Long, Treasurer. The Harmony Female Missionary Society and the Elkton Female Missionary Society, were received as auxiliaries. It was resolved, that the objects of the American Indian Mission Association were heartily approved, and that all sums sent up for that Association be paid to Elder R. T. Anderson, the Agent. An estimate of contributions during the year, and at the annual meeting by churches and individuals, amounted to \$1483 52, for Foreign Missions, Indian Missions, Bible Society, Home Missions, Book fund and Printing fund.

The BRACKEN ASSOCIATION, sustains vigorously a society named, "*The Bracken Association Bible and Foreign Missionary Society.*" One third of the funds received by the society are appropriated to the Kentucky China Mission Society, one third to the Indian Mission Association, and one third to the American and Foreign Bible Society. The Treasurer reported the receipt of \$64 97. The officers are John L. Kirk, President, Samuel S. Miner, Secretary, Henry C. Tureman, Treasurer.

The GASPER RIVER ASSOCIATION, sustains a society named, "*The Gasper River Bible Society,*" which held its sixth annual meeting, in August. The officers are, R. Render, President, B. S. Young, Secretary, Jared Tichenor, Treasurer. The sum of \$34 09, was acknowledged by the Treasurer.

The LONG RUN ASSOCIATION has no organization embracing the churches in its bounds, but several of the churches have systematic plans of benevolence. We feel grieved that the churches in Kentucky, contribute so little in support of the great object of benevolence, but regard the fact as chiefly attributable to the great destitution of ministers; so that although the churches enjoy opportunities to hear preaching, they are deprived of pastoral labor, and thus though the gospel is preached, and converts are baptized, they are not taught, "the all things whatsoever I have commanded you."

Your Board would urge upon the General Association the indispensable necessity of immediately appointing a General Agent, and taking efficient measures to advance the Redeemer's Kingdom in our state.

GEORGETOWN COLLEGE.

Plan for raising Five Hundred Dollars towards erecting a Building for the use of Students preparing for the Ministry.

Immediately upon the adjournment of the General Association, Elder R. T. Dillard was called to the chair, and Elder T. S. Malcom, appointed Secretary,

It was then stated that several of the students in Georgetown College preparing for the ministry, had hired a house, and by the generosity of friends in the vicinity, had been enabled to pursue their studies at a very small expense. The house which they occupied had just been sold, and no suitable place could be obtained. There were now twenty-two in the club, and some would be compelled to leave for want of funds to complete their studies. It was

suggested that as the College campus of eleven acres, affords abundant room for other buildings, an effort might be made to secure funds to erect a suitable building which should be the property of the College, for the use of students preparing for the ministry.

The following resolution was unanimously adopted.

Resolved, That we will endeavor to raise during the year in shares of five dollars, the sum of five hundred dollars towards the erection of a building for the use of students in Georgetown College, preparing for the ministry.

Report of the Board of Managers.

The Board of Managers of the Kentucky and Foreign Bible Society, in attempting to prepare a report of their proceedings for the past year, are too deeply impressed with the cheerless aspect of the past year, to commence the survey without indulging in an expression of their deep mortification and sorrow, that they have been able to effect so little for the great objects of the society. The pecuniary embarrassments of the country, and the great apathy which pervades the churches and the ministry upon the subject of benevolent action, and their entire want of system in these matters, have put it out of the power of your Board to effect anything worthy of their appointment, or the objects of the society.

Soon after their appointment, the attention of your Board was directed to the procurement of a suitable Agent to operate in their appropriate field, for the collection of funds and the sale and distribution of Bibles and Testaments; and their efforts to procure such an agent have been continued throughout the year, but without success. Such ministers as in the estimation of your Board were suited to the office, were either so entirely engaged in pastoral labor, as to prevent, or so discouraged in view of the pressure of the times, as to deter them from engaging in the service; so that nothing has been done in the department.

The attention of the Board was directed at an early period to the adjustment of the accounts of the society with the General Association of Kentucky, as proposed by the two bodies at their last anniversaries, and the arrangement agreed upon; but the money has not yet been received of that body by your Board.

Early in the year, your Board opened a correspondence with the parent society in New York, with a view to procure Bibles and Testaments for distribution in this State, but although that society manifested all readiness to comply with the wishes of your Board, still in consequence of the absence of Doct. Babcock, to whom the

letters were addressed, and partly in consequence of the failure of the mail, the books were not received until about the first of September. The lot which has come to hand consist of about 900 small Testaments for Sabbath schools, a few 12mo. and octavo Testaments, a large supply of cheap Bibles, and a few German Bibles and Testaments; which are deposited at the Banner office, where it is hoped the members and ministers will call for them as early as possible, in order that they may be circulated immediately and the funds applied to the purchase of other books for the same purpose.

The difficulty of procuring a suitable agent, and the consequent failure of the society to effect anything to purpose the past year, we trust will not be wholly disregarded by the churches and ministry. We trust that they will be admonished by this very state of things, that to effect anything worthy of the cause they have espoused, it is important that a uniform system be adopted, and that each church will immediately go systematically to work in support of the great objects of our denominational benevolence.

In closing this brief account of its doings your Board beg leave to offer devout thanks to the great author of the Bible, that, notwithstanding so little has been effected for its circulation in this State, still its holy pages have been unfolded to thousands hitherto sitting in darkness, and that the shout is heard in many lands, "The Lord God omnipotent reigneth."

MINUTES
OF THE
KENTUCKY BAPTIST MINISTER'S MEETING.

ORGANIZED AT FRANKFORT, JAN. 10, 1835.

CONSTITUTION.

Whereas, the improvement of the Christian ministry in vital piety, mutual love, union in principles and feelings, and co-operation in whatever may promote the kingdom of Christ, and the better preaching of the Gospel, is an object of paramount importance; and whereas, we feel a deep conviction that the stated meeting of ministers, and the free discussion of important subjects, relating to doctrinal, practical, and experimental religion, cannot fail to contribute to mutual improvement and the formation of ministerial character on a broader scale, and the uniting in a firmer phalanx of the armies of the living God, we adopt the following constitution.

ART. 1. This meeting shall be known by the name of the KENTUCKY BAPTIST MINISTER'S MEETING.

ART. 2. This meeting shall be composed of ordained ministers and licentiate, in the State of Kentucky, by a vote of a majority of those present, and by *signing the Constitution.*

ART. 3. The officers of this meeting shall be a Moderator chosen at each session, and a Secretary chosen annually.

ART. 4. The exercises of this meeting shall consist of a sermon, short written essays on important religious subjects, plans of sermons, explanation of passages of scripture by persons appointed at a previous meeting, together with such other exercises as may from time to time be introduced, with free conversation on those subjects and exercises.

ART. 5. The meeting shall convene annually at the time and place of the Kentucky Baptist General Association, and at such other times and places as shall be thought convenient.

ART. 6. This Constitution may be altered or amended at any annual meeting, by the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

Resolution, adopted in 1842.

Resolved, That, in future, brethren, who fail to write the essays assigned to them, shall make a donation of books to Georgetown College, such donation to be worth not less than five dollars.

The Eighth Annual Meeting of the Kentucky Baptist Ministers, was held in GEORGETOWN, commencing on Thursday, October 12th 1843.

As Elder John L. Waller, appointed to preach the Introductory sermon, was absent, it was voted that Elder Isaac McCoy preach a sermon introductory to the business of the meeting.

Elder Isaac McCoy preached from Mark xvi. 15, "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature."

At the close of the sermon, adjourned to meet this afternoon at 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ o'clock. Prayer by Elder Howard Malcom.

The Board was authorized to fill any vacancy, or make additions.

On motion, voted that hereafter there be at each annual meeting a sermon on Missions, and at its close a collection for the China Mission. Elder Wm. C. Buck was appointed to preach the annual sermon next year, and Elder Thomas S. Malcom, his alternate.

On motion, voted that the minutes be printed with those of the General Association, and that we pay our proportion of the expense.

The Committee appointed to make such alterations and amendments in the Constitution, as to adapt it to its present condition as a state organization connected with the Baptist General Convention for Foreign Missions, made the following report to the Board, which was adopted.

Constitution of the China Mission Society of Kentucky.

ARTICLE 1. This Society shall be known by the name of the CHINA MISSION SOCIETY OF KENTUCKY, auxiliary to the Baptist General Convention for Foreign Missions, according to the conditions, to which in the year 1840 the Board of the General Convention acceded.

ART. 2. The object of the society shall be to promote the preaching of the Gospel in CHINA, and among the nations that write, read or speak the Chinese language.

ART. 3. Any person may become a member of this society by contributing not less than one dollar annually. The payment of twenty dollars shall constitute any person a Member for Life. The payment of fifty dollars shall constitute a Director for Life.

ART. 4. Any Baptist Church, Association, or Missionary Society, contributing five dollars annually, shall be considered auxiliary, and shall be entitled to one delegate, and to an additional delegate for every additional five dollars.

ART. 5. The officers of this society shall be a President, six vice-Presidents, a Corresponding Secretary, a Recording Secretary, a Treasurer, and twenty directors; twelve of whom shall reside in Louisville or vicinity. Five shall constitute a quorum for business. All the officers shall be members of the Baptist church. An annual report shall be made to the society.

ART. 6. The annual meeting of this society shall be held in connection with the Kentucky Baptist General Association. An Introductory sermon shall be preached at each annual meeting, followed by a collection for the China Mission.

ART. 7. This constitution shall not be altered, except at an annual meeting, and by a vote of two-thirds of the members present.

The conditions referred to are contained in the following resolution.

Resolved, That we tender to the Baptist Board in Boston, a co-operation upon the following conditions, viz:

First. We reserve to this Society the entire legal control of the property of brother I. J. Roberts.

Secondly. We reserve the right of transacting our own internal business; such as appointing our Agents, electing our own officers, and directing in what way all the funds collected by this Society, for the China Mission, shall be applied.

Thirdly. That our missionary shall be recognized as other missionaries of that Board.

Fourthly. On our part, we pledge ourselves to act as faithful agents for that Board, in the collection and remittal of all funds obtained by us, for the other objects of that Board.

The statistics of the Associations opposed to Missionary Societies, Sunday schools, and similar Institutions, are this year placed by themselves. These are denominated in their own printed Minutes, as "Particular," "Regular," or "Predestinarian." It will be seen that only about one tenth of the Baptists in the state are of this class. The vast majority approve of benevolent societies, and in their Minutes are designated as "UNITED BAPTISTS;" or simply by the word "BAPTIST," as identified with the churches of the same faith and order throughout the United States.

ANTI-MISSION BAPTISTS IN KENTUCKY.

The views of this small portion of the Baptists in Kentucky, as distinguished from the great majority, may be best ascertained from their own Minutes.

The following extracts are from the Minutes of the LICKING Association, the largest Anti association in the state: "The Licking Association has witnessed with deep regret the various efforts which have been made to involve the memory of several valued ministers of the gospel, who lived and died members of her body, in the modern missionary institutions of the day. Some are curious to know why Elkhorn Association has not introduced Peter, James, John, the Master, or some other inspired witness, to sustain her missionary operations, instead of Ambrose Dudley, Joseph Redding, John Price, and others who made no pretensions to being inspired? A solution of the question is not difficult, when it is known that the Bible is silent as death on that subject." Again, "suppose some of our aged brethren had given countenance to missionary operations; we ask is the church justified thereby, (in the absence of Bible authority) in giving her support to an institution which it is believed has done, and is doing more to corrupt her, than, perhaps, any other?" And again, "We understand modern missionism to be at war with the doctrine of the Bible."

The circular letter of the PANTHER CREEK Association, gives this advice: "We further say to the churches, have nothing to do with the Bible Society, for we think it dangerous to authorize a few designing men to translate the holy Bible. Stand fast in the liberty wherewith Christ has set you free, and be not entangled with the yoke of bondage."

The GREEN RIVER Association in its Circular Letter of 1842, declares, "We confess we did correspond with our brethren when we knew they had something to do with these Missionary unscriptural societies, with a prayerful hope, that our brethren would see the evil of these things and forsake them; but, to our sad disappointment, we have found it grow worse, for they now have given liberty for the members to join any of the benevolent societies as they now exist, for this cause we are compelled to forsake our brethren, or the word of God. We, therefore, decidedly wish to inform our friends and brethren at large, that we believe that the Bible knows of no society but the church of Christ, in a religious point of view; so that we cannot receive into our fellowship either churches or members, who join one of those unscriptural societies."

The Minutes of the OBION Association for 1842, (six of its churches are in Kentucky and the remainder in Tennessee) contains the following paragraph: "Agreed to notice the request from Bethel church. Will this Association hold in fellowship any church who suffers her members to join the Temperance Societies, falsely so called? Whereupon this Association says, No! she will not."

PRESBYTERIANS IN KENTUCKY.

The statistics of the Presbyterians in Kentucky, are taken from the "Minutes of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian church in the United States. A. D. 1843."

All the churches in the state are embraced in the "Synod of Kentucky," which is composed of five "Presbyteries," namely: 1 Louisville, 2 Muhlenburg, 3 Transylvania, 4 West Lexington, 5 Ebenezer.

The Presbytery of Louisville reported 17 ordained ministers, 2 licentiates, 27 churches, and 1960 communicants.

The Presbytery of Muhlenburg reported, 11 ordained ministers, 1 licentiate, 22 churches, and 807 communicants.

The Presbytery of Transylvania reported 11 ordained ministers, 4 licentiates, 23 churches, and 1537 communicants.

The Presbytery of West Lexington reported 16 ordained ministers, 4 licentiates, 28 churches, 1893 communicants.

The Presbytery of Ebenezer reported 15 ordained ministers, 3 licentiates, 27 churches, and 980 communicants.

The Kentucky Conference contains ten districts; viz: Augusta, Covington, Lexington, Louisville, Hardinsburg, Shelbyville, Harrodsburg, Bowling Green, Hopkinsville and Barbourville.

THE CUMBERLAND PRESBYTERIANS, have a considerable number of churches. There is only one UNITARIAN church in the State. THE UNIVER-SALISTS, according to the "Universalist Almanac" for 1844, have 4 preachers and 4 societies. The Society at Louisville is the only one that has a meeting house.

The Minutes of each Association should contain the name of every ordained ministers in its bounds, printed in small capitals. Let the Post Office address of the clerk of the Association, be printed in the Minutes. A brief summary of the church letters would be in all cases valuable.

CAUSE OF DELAY.—The Minutes have not been printed sooner, in order that exact statistical information might be obtained from every part of the state. The Cor. Sec. has written more than fifty letters, besides articles in the Banner, for the purpose of obtaining the information in the preceding tables. Few are aware of the difficulty of compiling such tables. As the statistical tables form more than one half of the pamphlet it was deemed important to secure accuracy, even though delay was occasioned. This pamphlet now presents a condensed statement of the condition of all the churches in the state. The names of many ministers could not be ascertained, because not designated in the Minutes of many of the Associations. Any omission will be filled or error corrected, if the requisite information is forwarded.
