CONSTITUTION OF THE GENERAL ASSOCIATION.

ARTICLE 1. This body shall be called the GENERAL ASSOCIATION OF BAPTISTS IN KENTUCKY.

ART. 2. This Association shall be composed of representatives from such Baptist Churches and Associations as are in regular standing.

ART. 3. Every Church and Association contributing annually to the funds of this Association, shall be entitled to a representation.

ART. 4. Each contributor of thirty dollars, or more, shall be a member for life.

ART. 5. This Association shall, in a special manner, and to promote, by every legitimate means, the prosperity of the cause of God in this State.

ART. 6. It is distinctly understood, that this Association shall have no ecclesiastical authority.

ART. 7. At each meeting of this Association, there shall be elected, by ballot, a Moderator, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, Treasurer, and fifty Managers, (five of whom shall be a quorum,) who shall constitute a Board of Directors for the management of all the business of this Association, during the recess of its Annual Meetings, and annually report to the same their proceedings.

ART. 8. The Moderator, Secretaries, and Treasurer, shall perform the duties usually performed by such officers in similar Associations.

ART. 9. All Associations contributing to this, and co-operating in its designs, shall be considered auxiliary to it.

ART. 10. A General Agent may be appointed by the Association or Board of Managers, whose duty it shall be to survey all the destitution, the means of supply, &c., and report regularly to the Board, so as to enable them to meet the wants of the destitute. He shall also raise funds, and in every practical way promote the designs of the Association; for which he shall receive a reasonable support.

ART. 11. Any visiting brethren, in good standing, as such, shall be entitled to sit in counsel in the Annual Sessions of this Association, but shall not have the right to vote.

ART. 12. The Annual Meetings of this Association shall be on Monday, after the third Lord's Day in October.

ART. 13. This Constitution may be amended or altered, (the 6th Article excepted,) at any annual meeting, by a concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

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The thirteenth Annual Meeting of the General Association of Baptists, in Kentucky, was held with the First Baptist Church, in Covington, commencing on Monday, October 21st, 1850. The introductory sermon was preached by Rev. W. W. Gardner, of Maysville, from Matthew xiii: 33. "The Kingdom of Heaven is like unto leaven, which a woman took and hid in three measures of meal, till the whole was leavened."

The meeting was opened by prayer, by Elder A. D. Sears, of Hopkinsville. The names of Associations and Churches called, and letters read, and the names of the Messengers enrolled as follows:

Voted, that brethren Lynn, Campbell, Frost and Buck be a committee to report on the educational interests of the denomination.

Met pursuant to adjournment. Prayer by Elder J. A. Kirtley. The Treasurer's Report was read, approved and ordered to be

Voted, that at the recommendation of the General Agent, Elders J. L. Waller, J. W. Warder, and C. Lewis, be appointed a committee to apply to the next Legislature of Kentucky, for a Charter for

this Society.

Voted, that the Constitution be so amended as to constitute life members, by the payment of thirty dollars.

Voted, that Elder S. W. Lynn preach the next Introductory, and

Elder Wm. Vaughan his alternate.

Voted, that the District Associations be requested to publish in their minutes, or furnish the Board of this Association, answers to such questions, and information on such subjects, as the Circular which said Board is directed to send them, suggests

Voted, that the printing and distributing of the Minutes, be refer-

red to the Board.

Voted, that hereafter, the Annual Sermon shall be preached at 11 o'clock, A. M.; and that the amended Constitution be printed with the minutes.

REPORT OF THE GENERAL AGENT.

To the Board of the General Association of Baptists in Kentucky. DEAR BRETHREN:—In compliance with your request, and in order to fulfill my promise, I send you this as my final report. I received the appointment of General Agent, on 13th of October, 1849. with the full understanding that it would not be expeted that I would travel in inclement weather, or be engaged in the service of the Board, except during such favorable seasons as would enable me to perform for the Board, the most efficient service. I was engaged fifteen days in visiting and surveying Richmond and its vicinity, in reference to the location and support of a Missionary in that town.— The great object of the Board, was to ascertain if one could be supported in that field. My tour extended from Richmond, through the Counties of Garrard, Boyle and Mercer. The information which I received of the denomination, during that tour, the Board are already in the possession of. When I arrived at the village of Salvisa, I found the Baptist Church in a very despondent and lukewarm condi-Deeming it a destitute place, and a proper field for missionary services, and being greatly entreated by the good brethren, residing in that place, I remained and preached fifty sermons for them. The Church became greatly revived. Seventy were received into its fel lowship. All the old difficulties between the brethren in the Church. were settled. In and around Salvisa, nearly \$40 per year, for five years, were secured for the General Association. Fifty dollars were raised to finish their Meeting House. A Pastor was called, for two Sabbaths in each month, and \$200 promptly pledged for his support.

During the meeting, I visited a Church which is attended by brother Perry, one of the Missionaries of the Board, and secured \$40 towards his support. The first week in January, I visited Henderson, where I continued and preached seventy sermons to the Church and congregation; during which ninety professed religion, about forty of whom were baptized, and united with the Baptist Church. I visited New Albany, (Ia.) during the month of January, where I preached in the Baptist Church, forty-two sermons. Twenty were baptized, and united with the Baptist Church. In the month of March, I spent ten days, on a visit to Sharpsburg, Ky. With the objects, as well as the result of this tour, the Board are already acquainted. After which, I traveled two weeks for the Board; the intention of which was the best interests of the denomination; whether,

however, its ultimate result has been, or ever will be of any benefit to the them, time alone will determine. The first week in April, I visited Hopkinsville, and preached fifty sermons to the Baptist Church. Forty were baptized, and the final result, determined my location as the Pastor of the Church. I felt it to be my duty to inform the Board of the labor performed in all these meetings, that the members of the Board may know how I have passed my time. None of the time passed in these meetings, has been charged to the Board. The churches compensated me for my services. Whatever influence arose from my success, always was awarded to the General Association.

In the Report of the Board, they may dispose of this labor of mine as the members may deem most expedient. I passed twenty-eight days, in the month of June, in making a tour through Little Bethel Association; and, in visiting some of the Churches in the Gasper River Association. I raised \$160 per year, for five years, In Gasper River Association, in Little Bethel Association. ${f I}$ could not obtain subscriptions, but trust ${f I}$ aroused a spirit for home missions, which resulted in the organization, at the meeting of the Association, of a domestic mission, to be regulated by themselves. During my tour through Little Bethel Association, I tarried in Greenville seven days, and preached fourteen sermons; and also organized a Baptist Church of 26 members. Greenville is a pleasant village of 600 inhabitants—the county seat of Muhlenburg County. The Presbyterians have a fine female school at this place. The little church constituted by me, has pleasant prospects ahead.— The irregularity and lack of rigid discipline in the church in the vicinity of Greenville, gives this little body decided claims upon the community. They have already secured the services of brother Wiggin, as Pastor. Brother W. is favorably known as a pious and talented brother, and is very popular with the inhabitants of Greenville. The Hon. Mr. Rumsey has given the church a lot in a favorable position, and considerable progress has already been made, in obtaining subscriptions, in order to build a meeting house.

The foregoing contains a brief sketch of my operations as your General Agent.

In contemplating the present condition of the Baptist Churches and Associations in Kentucky in their home mission work, there is much to encourage the friends of missions. Scarcely an Association in the State, belonging to the great family of Baptists, but now either contributes to your treasury, or has a domestic mission of its own. When the Board of the General Association was first located in Georgetown, there were not a half-dozen associations engaged in the domestic missions; now, there are more than thirty. I verily believe, if an account of all the home mission work performed by the Baptists in Kentucky, could be obtained, it would be nearly as great, or perhaps greater, than that of the Baptists of any State in the

Union, except New York. The General Association has, directly or indirectly, and that too, since the Board was located in Georgetown, originated all this vast machinery for spreading the Gospel of the Saviour, over the hills and valleys of the State. In order that the Board may see and realize how progressive the spirit of home missions among the churches has been, I refer it to both Daviess County and Goshen Associations. One year ago, neither of them had any available system whatever. Your Agent, in September, 1849, visited some of the Chnrches in each of them; also attended the session of the Goshen Association, and labored with other good brethren, to organize an efficient system for supplying the destitute.

Last year, they expended for home mission labor, \$111. present year, they have raised more than \$200. Sickness prevented your General Agent from attending the session of Daviess County Association, in 1849; but the spirit awakened in behalf of, and the impulse given to home missions at the Goshen Association, with which Daviess County Association corresponds, made its way into the deliberations of the latter, and more than \$150 was expended during the past year, and more than \$300 raised for home missions, at their late annual meeting. We repeat, that there are few Associations in the State, that are not engaged with zeal, in having the gospel preached to the destitute. The Board can easily see from this view of the subject, that an efficient General Agent is needed. whose work shall be to travel through the Associations; to stir up. keep alive, and increase the spirit for home missions in the churches; to attend the annual meetings of the various District Associations; to gain information, as well as to aid in more efficiently organizing each for its work; and to seek to secure cordial co-operation in promoting harmony and union between the several associations; and, as occasions may offer, to increase the subscription to the common fund, belonging to the General Association, which must ever be the greater body around which the smaller must act.

In securing the services of a general agent, your late general agent is fully satisfied that more attention ought to be paid to his qualifications to make good impressions, than to his ability to obtain liberal collections. Time and experience have fully established the fact. that in too many instances, societies have measured the qualifications of agents by their capacity to collect money; while, in many instances, the money obtained, left the giver in a spirit so unfriendly, that nothing afterwards, in behalf of missions, could be obtained.— If the members of our Churches, in the absence of due and proper instruction, are too urgently importuned by inexperienced, or indifferently qualified agents, it will greatly retard and injure the cause of missions, in place of promoting and advancing it. During my general agency, I have found many good brethren in this unhappy condition. I can assure the Board, that according to the extent of my ability, I have endeavored to do my duty; and so exhibit the claims

of the Board, as to encourage and promote a missionary spirit among the members of our churches. The general association is engaged in a great work. Great things may be accomplished by the Board, not only for this, but for future generations. To do this, however, a great deal of information, as well as prudence, is necessary. When missionaries are needed, great caution should be observed in selecting them. In some cases, through the advice of impulsive and injudicious brethren, appointments have been made, that have resulted in no good. I respectfully suggest the propriety hereafter, that the Board adopt a rule, requiring at least a recommondation from a majority of the churches in the Association, before the missionary go forth under the authority of the Board. Such a course will invariably secure the confidence of the District Association, as well as induce the affection of the churches. I also believe, that had the General Association some system of making life members, much monev might be secured. Other societies have practised this with great success. Were the general association a chartered body, it would give the Board more consideration in the minds of the people.

In closing my connexion with the Board, I can assure the members thereof, that wherever Providence may cast my lot, I shall feel it a great privilege, as well as recognise it a solemn duty, cheerfully to embrace every occasion to aid them in their laudable and sublime work. REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION.

The Committee on the Educational Interests of the Denomination, made the following Report, which was accepted:

Your Committee, appointed to report upon our Educational Inter-

ests in this State, would offer the following Report—

Georgetown College, as at present organized, is, we are gratified to learn, in a healthy and prosperous condition, and affords ample facilities for obtaining a thorough classical and scientific education. It has an able Faculty, consisting of J. L. Reynolds, D. D., President, and four other able Instructors; it has, also, a flourishing preparatory department. Valuable additions have lately been made to the apparatus—philosophical, chemical and mathematical,—making it more extensive, it is believed, than that possessed by any other Western College. Your committee cannot too strongly urge upon the denomination the claims of this institution. They believe the endowment fund ought to be greatly increased—This institution has been already a great blessing to the denomination, and the country at large.

Your committee are also gratified to learn, that a High School has been established at Russellville, in this State. This institution, it is believed, will greatly promote the interests of education, in the Southern part of the State. Your committee are of opinion that such schools ought to be established in every County in the State.

Covington Theological Institute, located in this city, is now in a more flourishing condition than it has ever been, and is able to afford every facility for obtaining a Theological education. This institution is worthy of the confidence and support of the denomination.

The following preamble and resolutions, offered by Elder Wm. M. Pratt, were unanimously adopted:

Whereas, it is desirable to secure the following ends-

1. The awakening anew general interest among the Baptists of Kentucky, in the objects of the General Association.

2. The representation of every district Association in Kentucky,

in the General Association.

3. The establishment of a Baptist Church in every County Town in Kentucky, and the sustaining of Missionary labor in destitute places of our State.

4. The circulation of Baptist literature throughout the State.

Therefore, Resolved. That it shall be required of the General Agent—

1. To visit the district Associations, and endeavor to secure their

representative co-operation.

2. To survey the destitution of the State, and recommend to the Board, from time to time, suitable men to act as Missionaries for the destitute parts.

3. To have supervision of the Colpoteur system.

4. And to act as circumstances may dictate, as Agent, General Missionary, Colporteur, &c., &c.

The following preamble and resolution were adopted.

Whereas, the promotion of religious intelligence among our people is of primary importance to our denominational interests, as well as to spiritual improvement; and whereas, the Baptist Banner and the Western Baptist Review have these ends for their aim—

Therefore, Resolved, That these two periodicals are, by their growing adaptation and excellent bearing, highly deserving the pat-

ronage of our ministry and people.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD

ALLENDAR CONTRACTOR CO

The past year has been marked with nothing of peculiar interest in the history of the missionary operations connected with your body. The missionaries have labored with great satisfaction to the Board. In some instances God has signally blessed their efforts, and, in every case, that good seed has been sown, which we confidently believe, will hereafter yield an abundant harvest to the glory of God, and the salvation of immortal souls.

We regret that our General Agent, the Rev. A. D. Sears, has not been able to give himself entirely to the work, and that he has felt it his duty to leave this for another field of labor. There is now no general agent in the employ of the board. We have been endeavering to obtain a suitable person, but have not yet succeeded. Our missionaries generally act as agents in their respective fields of labor, and the pastors of some churches have a systematic plan for raising funds for benevolent objects. These arrangements cannot, however, supercede the necessity of a general agent, who shall visit the whole State, and thus secure a union of effort, and awaken a general interest, by making the different churches acquainted with the wants of the destitute, and the plans adopted by sister churches.

Brother Sears will lay before you a report of his own labors, and give such information, and make such suggestions as he may deem

expedient.

The following brethren have been employed in the service of the board. The labors of some have extended over the whole year, and of others, over only a few months. We mention all who have been supported, to any extent, by the board, together with their fields of labor. They are paid only for the time of actual service.

The following is a brief summary of the labors of the several missionaries, as far as they have made their reports:

BROTHER H. M. MILLER

Writes as follows: "One has been baptized, and several have been inquiring what they shall do to be saved. Others have been reclaimed, and although there is much prejudice among the German population against Baptist sentiments, yet, there is reason for encouragement, and a wide field of usefulness is here presented before the devoted missionary."

BROTHER S. L. HELM

Says: "I preached on one occasion in the vicinity of Owingsville, to a very large audience, many of whom said it was the first time they had heard a Baptist preach, most of them being Methodists. I find there is a growing desire in this county to learn all about the Baptists. At Mt. Sterlingthe prospects are decidedly unpromising. The Baptists have no place for public worship, and are few in number. At Sharpsburg, the prospect is

more encouraging, and the church is in quite a flourishing condition.
BROTHER CHARLES B. EGAN

Has been in the service of the Board about three months, and has baptized four, two of whom had been Presbyterians.

BROTHER DANIEL BUCKNER

Has labored 44 days; rode 300 miles; preached 52 sermons; visited 10 churches; constituted 1, and received one member by baptism.

Bro. S. S. Perry

Reports that he has traveled 2,305 miles; preached 180 sermons; delivered 17 exhortations; baptized 10; received by letter, 5; restored 2, and held 6 protracted meetings. Among these received, were 4 Reformers and 1 Presbyterian.

Bro. S. V. Potts

Has labored 108 days; preached 93 sermons; delivered 15 exhortations; traveled 1,323 miles, and baptized 20. He says: "The Baptist cause is overcoming all opposition in my field of labor."

Bro. F. German

Has labored 120 days; preached 100 sermons; baptized 26, and reports very great destitution of preaching in his field of labor.

BRO. J. B. PORTER

Has been in the service of the Board since the 1st of April, preaching two and three times a week and has baptized twenty.

Bro. H. ADAMS

Has travelled 600 miles; preached 72 sermons, and baptized 22.

Bro. A. SMITH

Reports 45 sermons, and 14 baptisms, with very encouraging prospects.

Bro. D. S. Colgan

Has preached 200 sermons; held several protracted meetings, and baptized 22.

Bro, W. W. WHAYNE

Has labored 149 days; preached 93 sermons; delivered 40 exhortations, and baptized 48; among whom was one Presbyterian and one Methodist.

Bro. D. R. CAMPBELL

Has preached regularly with the chuch at Newport. His labors have been greatly blessed, in building up the church at this important point. He writes as follows: "Our protracted meeting has continued 10 weeks. There have been 130 conversions and baptisms. We have a Sabbath School, numbering 150 pupils. Besides the Wednesday night prayer meetings, we have a weekly male and female prayer meeting; also, a teacher's prayer-meeting, on Sabbath morning. Almost every one, male and female, of the new additions, take part in our prayer-meetings."

As some of our missionaries have failed to send in their annual reports, and as many of those sent are very deficient in respect to the details of their labor and its results, we are unable to lay before

you an accurate statement of the results of our missionary efforts for the past year. We hope that the missionaries will hereafter be

more particular in this respect.

Missionaries Employed by the District Associations.—A great amount of labor is performed by missionaries, under the immediate direction of the several district Associations. It is unfortunate that we have so few reports from these bodies. Until some regular plan is adopted, we can give but a meagre account of missionary labor

performed in the State.

Goshen Association.—This Association has employed two missionaries in the field, a portion of the past year, who have labored with much acceptance and success. Elder Wm. Head reported 40 days labor-preached some 70 or 80 discourses, and baptized 15 persons, Elder S. Buchanan labored 92 days, traveled 380 miles, preached 408 sermons, delivered 53 exhortations, and baptized 21 persons. This Association has more than doubled their fund for the ensuing year, and we hope their labors will be abundantly blessed by the Great Head of the Church.

Daviess County Association.—This Association has become auxiliary to the General Association, and employed two missionaries a part of the year. Elder K. G. Hay reports that he has labored 46 days, preached 37 sermons, delivered 12 exhortations, constituted one church, and traveled 407 miles. He also reports 12 professions of religion, 6 of whom united with the church. Elder D Dowden labored 22 days; preached 50 sermons; delivered 6 lectures; traveled 320 miles. These brethren were sick a portion of the time, which necessarily circumscribed their labors. They will be enabled to keep a missionary in the field the whole of the ensuing year.

West Union Association.—This Association has employed two missionaries the present year-Elders White and Herrington-to give their whole time to the work; and we have no doubt their labors will be blessed in the conversion of sinners, and the upbuilding of

the church.

If all our Associations had sent in their reports of missionary labor, we could have given a synopsis of the results in this report. We hope our brethren hereafter will do their duty in this respect, and send in reports to the Corresponding Secretary of the General Association, that a summary of missionary labor performed in the State

may be published in the Minutes.

By a resolution at your last annual meeting, your Board was authorized to appoint a general agent for the procuring and distributing of standard works of our denomination, and very soon thereafter, we passed the following resolution: "Voted, that in accordance with a request from the Bible Society we furnish their agent with dollars worth of books, to be distributed for, and on account of this society, and that he be requested to report quarterly to this Board."

This action was had at the request, and in the presence of the Corresponding Secretary of the Bible Society, and we supposed that that Society would arrange it so as to apply for the funds, when wanted; but, not having done so, nothing further has been done in

the premises.

In conclusion, Dear Brethren, we feel encouraged to prosecute still more vigorously, the great work in which we have embarked; and we would earnestly pray that the Holy Spirit may be poured out in copious effusions upon all our churches, that they may, with a united effort, sustain, with more Heavenly ardor, the cause of missions, as the great means in the hands of God, of regenerating our fallen world. ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD.

The Managers of the Kentucky Foreign Missionary Society, in presenting an account of their labors during the past year, have, as is usually the case, to record some grounds, both of discouragement and encouragement. Throughout, however, they can trace the presence of God, and feel that there has been cause for gratitude.

The change made in the location of the Board, at the last annual meeting, necessarily caused some delay in arranging for the business of the year. This was no sooner overcome, than a more serious occasion of delay occurred in the resignation of the General Agent, Elder J. W. Goodman. This deprived the board of an Agent for at

least six months in the best part of the year.

Among the causes of discouragement, the Board would not overlook the death of Elder Harvey Goodale, on his arrival in Africa.—Brother Goodale was educated and prepared for the work of Missions, in this State, and was emphatically one of us. His early death is, therefore, justly to be regarded as bearing on our Missionary enterprise. He was a godly man, and God has taken him.

While these causes of discouragement have occurred, during the year, there have been also some cheering indications. Early in the year, our corps of Missionaries was increased, in the person of sister Roberts, who has gone to China, to labor with her husband. Correspondence has been held with a gifted and pious young preacher, in this State, with a view to his going on a European mission, and there is some hope of ultimate success.

After much correspondence, Elder William Sym, of Russellville, a well known and tried agent in other departments of missionary work, was secured for the General Agency. He entered upon his labor about the first of July, with flattering success. The sum of

has been realized.

It is proper here to inform you, that the Board, during the past year, have assumed the entire management of the Foreign enterprise in the State. They now appoint and pay, and are responsible for their agent; and he is directly responsible to them, instead of to the parent Board, as heretofore. It is believed that this will be found an improvement.

The Board feel that the claims of this cause require to be more clearly seen and felt throughout the State; and they therefore recommend that all the Ministers interested in its success, preach more

frequently on the subject, and press its claims.

CONSTITUTION

OF THE

KENTUCKY FOREIGN MISSION SOCIETY.

ARTICLE 1. This Society shall be known by the name of the Kentucky Baptist Foreign Missionary Society, Auxiliary to the Southern Baptist Convention.

ART. 2. The object of the Society will be to promote the preaching of the Gospel in all the fields under the Southern Baptist Con-

vention.

ART. 3. Any person may become a member of this Society by contributing not less than one dollar annually. The payment of twenty dollars shall constitute any person a member for life. The payment of fifty dollars shall constitute a director for life.

ART. 4. Any Baptist Church, Association, or Missionary Society, contributing five dollars annually, shall be considered auxiliary, and shall be entitled to one delegate, and to an additional delegate for ev-

ery additional five dollars.

ART. 5. The Officers of this Society shall be a President, six Vice Presidents, a Corresponding Secretary, a Recording Secretary, a Treasurer, and twenty Directors—twelve of whom shall reside in Covington, or vicinity. Five shall constitute a quorum for business. All the officers shall be members of the Baptist Church. An annual report shall be made to the Society.

ART. 6. The annual meeting of this Society shall be held in connexion with the Kentucky Baptist General Association. An introductory sermon shall be preached at each annual meeting, followed

by a collection for the objects of the Society.

ART. 7. This Constitution shall not be altered, except an annual meeting, and by a vote of two-thirds of the members present.

- 4. Resolved, That we approve of every organization and effort which have for their design the translation of the Scriptures without mutilation and without concealment, in all languages.

the Board of this Society for the past year, and that they are entitled to our grateful acknowledgements for the zeal and energy with which they have prosecuted the objects of the Society.

The following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That all persons in Kentucky who have heretofore been Life-Members and Life-Directors of the American and Foreign Bible Society, shall hereafter be Life-Members and Life-Directors of this Society.

Brother Buck offered the following resolutions, which were adopted:

Resolved, That the money heretofore subscribed to the Agents of

this Society, and yet unpaid, belongs to this Society.

Resolved, That the subscribers now indebted to the Kentucky and Foreign Bible Society, have the right to direct their money to any destination they may judge proper, and the Board shall so forward it.

Resolved, That five hundred copies of the minutes be printed and distributed to those who have contributed five dollars.

On motion, the Board were instructed to draft a series of resolutions to be printed in connection with the minutes expressive of the feelings of this Society, respecting the death of the lamented Adoniram Judson, D. D., late Missionary to Burmah.

Adjourned to meet in Hopkinsville.

At a meeting of the Board in Frankfort, Nov. 4th, the following resolutions relative to the death of Dr. Judson, were unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That as the object of our organization is to furnish the living oracles of God to all nations, we have received with deepsorrow the intelligence of the death of Rev. Adoniram Judson, Senior Missionary of the American Baptist Missionary Union. That we have regarded him as a special instrument in the hands of the Great Head of the Church, in building up the Kingdom of Christ among the heathen, and bringing glory to the name of our God. That we acknowledge with devout gratitude the providence of God in preserving his life through the dangerous privations and afflictions through which it was his lot to pass, and in enabling him to do so much towards giving to the heathen the Bible faithfully translated into their own tongue.

Resolved, That in view of his uniform exemplification of the Christian character, the purity of his life, his fidelity and patience in the discharge of the duties of his vocation, that while we mourn our loss, we rejoice in his exceeding great gain, believing as we do.

REPORT OF THE BOARD.

The Board of Managers of the Kentucky and Foreign Bible

Society, beg leave to submit the following as their report:

Providence has graciously spared the lives of all the members of your Board, and entire harmony has prevailed in her councils. We have endeavored, to the best of our ability, to carry out the designs of the Society in the collection and appropriation of monies, so generously contributed for the circulation of the Word of God among different nations. Inasmuch as the American Indian Mission Society, and the Southern Baptist Convention are not extensively engaged, at present, in the work of Bible distribution, most of the contributions to your Society have been devoted to continental Europe.

The Parent Society has her colporteurs in Germany, and will soon, we hope, have them in Italy and Spanish America. The monies we forward go through the Board at New York, as our Agent, directly to their destination, without passing into the treasury of any Missionary body, unless by permission of your Board.

The Kentucky and Foreign Bible Society never has relinquished the right to direct the appropriation of her funds, and the right has

ever been recognized by the Board of the Parent Society.

Your Board has been unable to secure the services of a suitable man as agent for the entire year; but have had three in the field

for portions of the year.

The venerable A. Maclay, D. D., served us for three months, in the Green River section, mainly, and his labors were crowned with his usual success. He was engaged for about the same length of time, in the bounds of the Bothel Bible Society, and in her direct employ. Although that Society is directly auxiliary to the Parent Society, and consequently her funds do not pass into your treasury, yet it was thought advisable to publish the subscriptions and contributions, obtained from Kentucky churches in that Society, in connection with those of the State Society. The agent has accordingly forwarded his subscription list which is appended to the report.

It appears from his report, he obtained while in the employ of the Bethel Bible Society, in subscription, \$3,087 65; in cash, \$382-65; making in cash and subscription, \$4,070 50. During the three months in our employ, he obtained in subscription, \$2,395 70; in cash, \$1,129 85; in cash and subscription, \$3,525 55.

On the 4th of June, he requested to be released from his agency until the 1st of September, and promised the Board to return at that time and resume his labors.

We have received no communication from him since that time. It is understood, he has embraced the policy of the American Bible Union, and has consented to act as agent of her Board. This movement of Elder Maclay has disappointed us very much, as we confidently relied upon him to canvass the central portion of the State. He deserves, however, the lasting esteem of the Society for his devotion to the Bible cause, and his efficiency while among us.

Your Board, desirous of carrying out the wishes of the Society and General Association respecting the distribution of bibles and Baptist standard works, in our own State, on the 29th of October, employed Rev. Isaac Niles as her colporteur and agent. He was directed to collect funds for the Society, during the inclemency of the winter, and early in the Spring to engage in the work of bible distribution. Efforts were put forth to obtain the co-operation of the Board of the General Association—we furnishing bibles to her colporteurs, and she furnishing religious works for ours. The effort has proved a failure however, she not having procured the books, or obtained the services of a colporteur; and on our part, by the unwillingness of Elder Niles to undertake the work. Your Board has therefore continued Brother Niles in the agency and for the time he has been engaged he has succeeded beyond our expectation. He reports having obtained, during nine months service, in cash, \$645 38; in subscription, \$1,359 50; in cash and subscription, \$2,-004 88. He has moreover collected on the subscription obtained by Elder Maclay, in 1849, \$211 00.

The Rev. R. W. Thomas, of Glasgow, has recently accepted an agency from your Society, and from the reputation he has for piety, talents, and efficiency, we entertain high hopes of his usefulness. We are unable to state what he has done, as his report has not

vet come to hand.

Your Corresponding Secretary reports he has received upwards of \$400 00, in individual subscriptions and for sale of Bibles. It appears from the reports of your agent, there has been obtained through their efforts during the year, in cash, \$3,378 85; in subscription, \$6,842 85; in all, \$10,221 70. In subscribing and contributing that amount, 27 have become Life Members of the Society, by the payment of \$30 dollars each; of whom 6 were constituted Life Members by the Churches with which they were connected. 264 have pledged to become Life Members, of whom 184 have paid their first installment, and 72 have paid nothing as yet. In obtain-

ing these pledges, 11 churches have promised to constitute their pastors Life Members, and the remainder were individual pledges.

During the two years in which you have entrusted this department of christian effort to our hands, there has been raised in actual cash, not mentioning what was done by the Bethel Society, and others, independent of a connexion with your society, by agents in your direct employ \$4,558 67, and pledges to the amount of \$6,653 20 In subscriptions and cash, \$11,211 87. Aside from expenses incurred in the management of the Depository, the whole expense involved in conducting the affairs of your Society for two years, including salaries of Agents, travelling and incidental expenses, have not exceeded a thousand dollars.

We have only to add, that it was deemed advisable to have a Depository of Bibles and Testaments, bearing the imprint of the A. & F. B. S., in Kentucky. We have accordingly ordered and received four hundred dollars worth. Bro. D. Burbank, Merchant, at Lexington, has kindly consented to act as Depository Agent, and

to keep and make sale of them without compensation.

Note.—Elder Maclay informed the Corresponding Secretary, he forwarded directly to New York, to be placed to the credit of the Kentucky and Foreign Bible Society, a large portion of the funds he obtained in the southern portion of the State, and his salary, by order of the Board, was paid out of those funds. This is the reason why the Treasurer's Report does not exhibit the actual amount contributed. Had all collected by your agents, been paid in the treasury, the credit would have exhibited \$2,510 31, which sum, together with \$982 85, collected by Elder Maclay, in the bounds of the Bethel Association, deducting the amount in the Treasury at the last meeting of the Society, makes the gross sum actually raised by Elders Maclay and Niles, \$3,378 85; the gross amount in subscription, \$6.842 85; total in subscription and cash, \$10,221 70.
